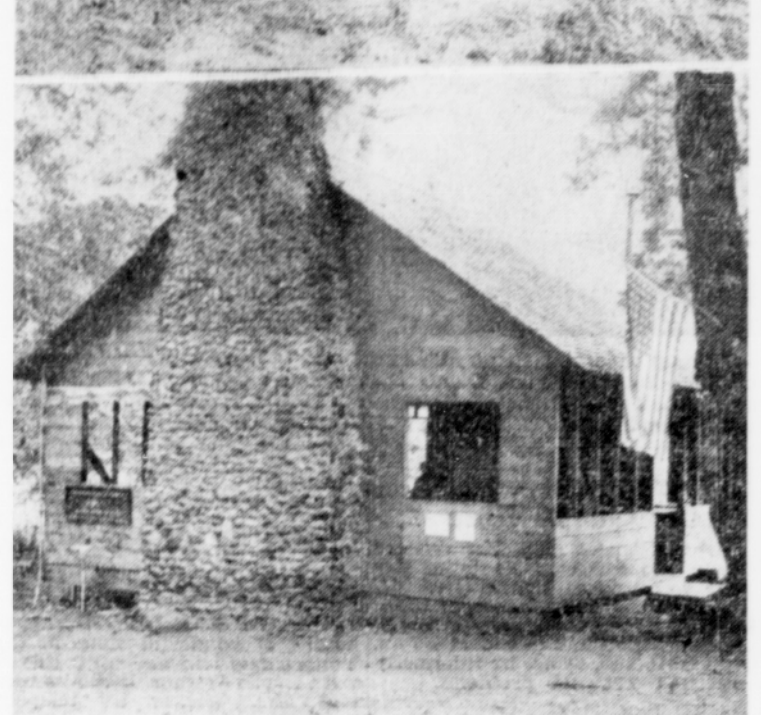
The bride's mother wore a long blue net dress with feather hat, and the bridegroom's mother wore turquoise blue with coral accessories.

RNA Membership Contest Closes

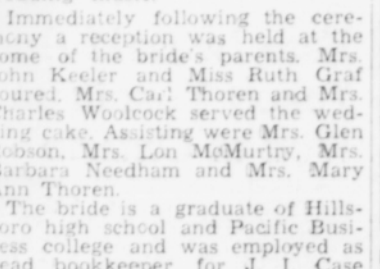

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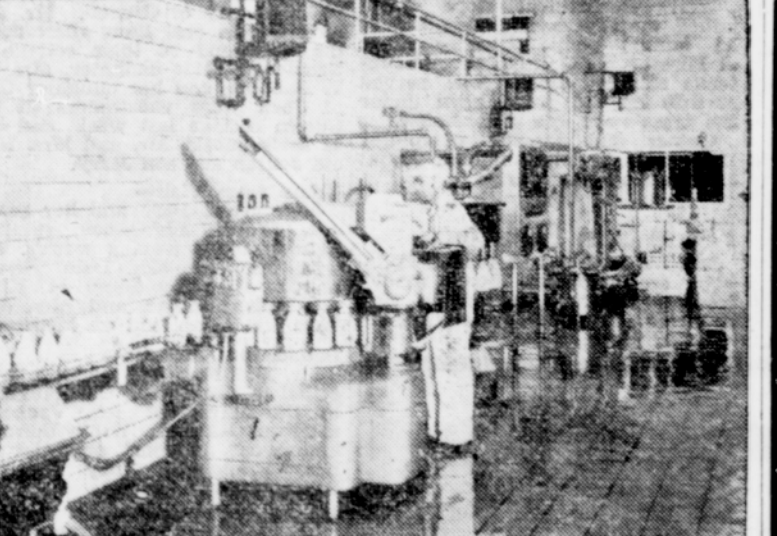
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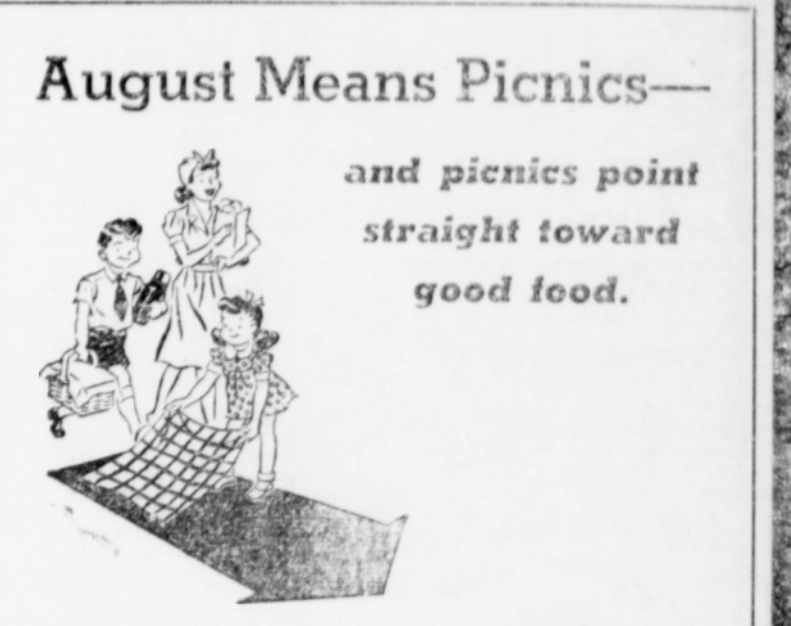
