F. F. A., 4-H Club Interest Keen

Competition Develops for Club Trophy

More Than Thousand Boys, Girls Expected To Enter Activity

Four-H club and Future Farmers of America competition, always a big feature of the annual county fair, is expected to be even keener than usual with more than a thousand county boys and girls expected to enter.

Resumption of the Oregon state fair at Salem has given an added incentive as many county winners will have an opportunity to compete for further honors. Heavy rivalry has developed between the River Valley, Tualatin, Mountain Home, Rock Creek and Hillsboro dairy clubs for the Calf Manna trophy, according to Joe Cox, assistant county agent, who is superintendent of boys' club work for the fair.

Style Revue Set

County 4-H girls, under supervision of Miss Faye Nichols, county home demonstration agent, and Miss Beryl Scott, assistant, will be active. Girls' style revue modeling will be Saturday at 3 p. m. F. F. A. competition will get underway with J. B. Thomas, Smith-Hughes agriculture instructor at Hillsboro union high, in charge. Livestock judging contest for F. F. A. along with 4-H will start at 10:30 a. m. Thursday.

Swine Friday

F. F. A. and 4-H swine showmanship and judging competition is scheduled for Friday morning starting at 9:30. F. F. A. dairy showmanship and judging and 4-H dairy classes judging are on the Friday afternoon program, followed by judging of crops.

Announcement and presentation of special awards comes at 4:30 p. m. Saturday. A new trophy to be presented is offered by Don Hagg, Dayton, N.Y., and J. J. Josaf, for champion dairy showman of the fair. The three donors of the revolving trophy are former club members and leaders in the activity. The Calf Manna trophy is perpetual and offered by Carnation Company for the dairy club making the highest score.

Dr. Brown Sells Local Practice

Dr. P. G. Brown, Hillsboro dentist, has sold his practice and equipment to Dr. D. W. Byrd of Portland, effective September 1. It was announced this week. Dr. Brown has served the community for the past 12 years.

Two schools, Forest Grove and Aloha-Huber, were still reported seeking men to teach physical education.

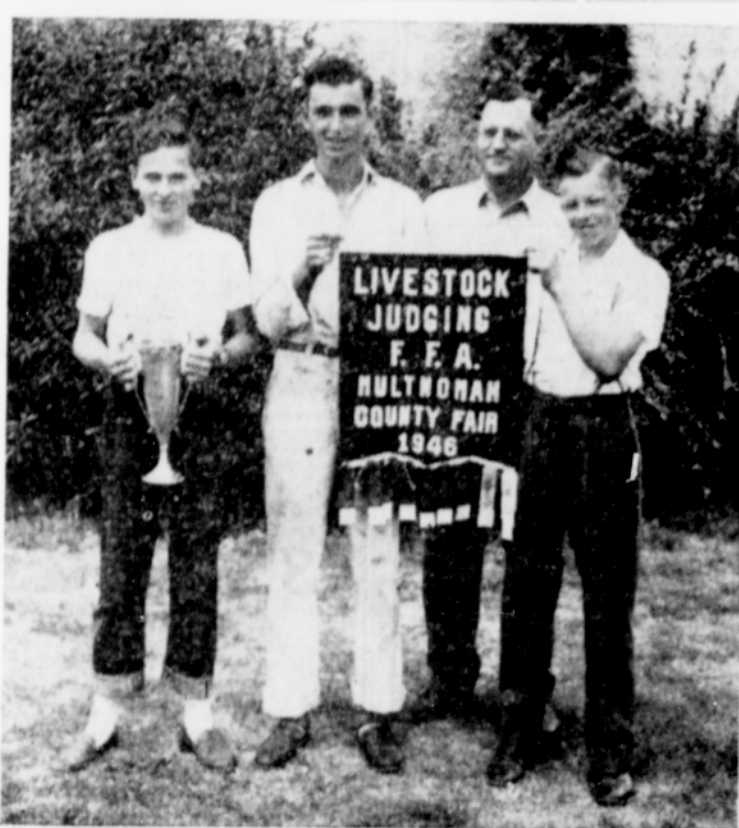
Bean Harvester Claims Record for Picker Duo

Ed Carothers, who raises beans out two miles east of Hillsboro, got sort of weary of reading in the Portland papers of how pickers in other places were claiming picking records on per-day poundage. So he turned his two top pickers loose one day last week and they went up in a figurative photo-finish, and with what Ed believes is not only a county record but maybe tops for the state. Anyway he's waiting to hear of a better performance.

Mrs. Reva Raymond of route 2, Beaverton, and Mrs. Mabel Horn-ecker of route 5, Hillsboro, each picked 340½ pounds of pole beans in a 10-hour race in the Carothers beans race which was held at the Carothers farm early in the month was 521.

400 Pounds High
Walter Krich, field representative for Birds Eye-Snyder plant at Hillsboro contracting the Carothers yield, says he covers a lot of bean yards in this area and rarely hears of a picker topping 400 pounds per day.

The local records were done in the straggles Blue Lake variety of pole bean which ordinarily does not yield as much as the regular Blue Lake. On last Thursday the pickers at Mr. Carothers' place went past the eight-ton mark per acre in the pole beans. The farmer also has five acres of wax beans. He expects a total yield of around

A two-day orientation period for freshmen will be held on September 3 and 4 when new students will have an opportunity to meet the faculty and see the building. Bus routes will operate on those two days for the benefit of the freshmen.

Exhibits Cram Five Buildings

F. F. A., 4-H Activities, Pageant "Hiawatha", Horse and Dog Shows, Hobbies Included

Back on a full-scale basis for the first time since before the war, the Washington county fair today (Thursday) opens its three-day show with a full docket of entertainment and five buildings crammed with exhibits for the benefit of patrons. The fair winds up Saturday night and is expected to draw a record attendance, according to Manager Leon Davis.

Boy Scouts Return Sunday from Trip To Yellowstone

The long-heralded Hillsboro district Boy Scout trip to Yellowstone National park came to a happy and Sunday when the 41 boys and their leaders returned home after two weeks of sight-seeing.

Final round-up meeting and presentation of awards will be held at the courthouse Thursday (tonight) at 7:30, according to C. Bryant Walker, field executive. Ted Gardner, scoutmaster of the Yellowstone troop, will preside.

Jack Merrill is to be presented the Outstanding Faithful service award for the trip, a bronze medal. M. Peter Amacher and Bryan Walker, Jr. were close seconds for the award. Good Camper awards won by boys as a result of daily inspection will be presented. Movies and other pictures will probably be shown.

The trip went smoothly with no sickness and no serious accidents resulting, according to Walker. Highlights of the trip included a swim in Couer d'Alene lake, Idaho, at 6:30 in the morning, a glimpse of Yellowstone canyon, a 12-mile hike at the Teton Peaks park in Wyoming, a swim in the Great Salt Lake, a day at Old Faithful where the boys saw perform numerous times, fishing off the fishing bridge at Yellowstone lake, and glimpses of the Grand Canyon of the Yellowstone.

Several of the boys were photographed in front of Old Faithful for a 1947 calendar. Reels of color film were taken and will be shown locally later. The Oregon Motor stages driver was highly praised by the group for his cooperation.

The troupe presents the episode in the life of Hiawatha as portrayed by Henry Wadsworth Longfellow in his famous poem. Indian music and tribal dances are included in the presentation which will start at 8 p. m. at the ball park on August 29, 30 and 31. Admission for adults \$1.00 and for children 50 cents.

Indian Writer-Director
Mrs. Naomi Wagner, who lives at the Warm Springs Indian agency, is writer and director of the pageant which has been successfully presented in Redmond, Eugene, and other Oregon cities.

Spectators will see an authentic presentation of life in the primitive Indian villages of the time when the white man came to America. In the wedding scene, when old Sakomis calls the tribe for the feast at the union of Minnehaha and Hiawatha, an actual ceremony will be performed in the same manner as practiced on the reservation. With the exchange of gifts between families of the bride and groom.

Pitt Plays Hiawatha
Lewis Pitt, son of the late George Pitt, prominent in Indian affairs on the reservation until his death, plays the chief role of Hiawatha. The character is based on Indian legend of a person of miraculous birth sent to the tribes to clear their forests, rivers and fishing grounds and teach them the arts of peace.

Most of the cast are descendants of Indians well known in Oregon history. Playing the part of Minnehaha is Harriet Minnick, granddaughter of Lum-Chunnie, or Arrowhead, a signer of the Indian treaty of 1855. Alex Tohat, who plays Gutche Manatote, is son of Jim Tohat, one of the great medicine men, and his grandfather, Shak-kar, was also a Warm Springs scout during the Modoc war.

Four of the War Dancers are veterans of World War II, with a lot of action overseas. Veterans of both wars also are scattered through the cast.

Besides the pageant each evening, the Indians are planning a program in their village which will include Indian games and other actual activities of the village. Exhibits also will be on hand from the Warm Springs reservation.

The charge for the pageant will be made to defray the cost of transporting the tribes to Hillsboro, but the program in the Indian village will be free to the public. It was announced.

While at Honolulu he said: "Roses are one type of flower that does not thrive in the islands, yet people here are as anxious to have them as are mainlanders. Because they weigh so little we can pay cargo costs and still sell them in Honolulu shops at about the same price charged by Portland retailers. Teufel said he would ship roses only by the direct route as the business would be impractical if shipment was made through San Francisco. He negotiated with Hawaiian growers to furnish fresh-cut tropical flowers for one-day delivery to Portland florists.

Schedule for Hillsboro Grade Schools Announced

Hillsboro elementary schools will open for the 1946-47 year on Monday, September 9, according to J. W. Poynter, superintendent. It is important that every child enter the first day or some time during the first week if at all possible.

He said, Teachers will be in their rooms by 8:00 each morning to receive pupils. New students are asked to report to the principal of each building to be assigned.

Superintendent Poynter announced the following hours to be kept at each building, David Hill and Peter Boscow: kindergarten and grades I, II and III—morning session, 9 to 11:30 a. m.; afternoon session, 12:30 to 2:30. Grades IV and V—mornings, 9 to 12; afternoons, 1 to 3:40. For B. W. Burns building: grades VI, VII and VIII—mornings, 8:45 to 12; afternoons, 1 to 3:40. At the close of school each day all children are expected to leave the buildings immediately unless being detained under proper authority.

Superintendent Poynter wrote the following for the benefit of parents and students: "For the first week of school the children are in school only for the morning sessions. Buses will leave at 12:00 noon to return children to

Junior Western Horse show at the ball park Friday at 2:30 p. m. is open to any junior rider 16 years and under and includes 16 events of the type listed for the senior show. Admission will be free.

Mutt Dog show, a feature sponsored by the Hillsboro Rotary club, will be Saturday at 1:30 p. m. The popular event invites a large participation by county children.

"Hobby Hall," which will occupy the entire second floor of the Farmers' Union building, is attracting more interest than ever before and is expected to offer a wide variety of hobbies. A new section of the hobby exhibit will be added. The senior hobby division, antiques, and a photography division.

The junior hobby division, general division for creative work and collections of not less than three objects and photography (best Washington county fair collection, best action, best group). Hillsboro Lions club sponsors "Hobby Hall."

Annual flower show, sponsored by the Beaverton Garden club, will show flowers from all parts of the county in the Grange building. Sections will be devoted to roses, dahlias, gladioli, artistic arrangements, garden photographs, novelty arrangements, children's garden club arrangements, and also a section for asters, chrysanthemums, geraniums, hydrangeas, marigolds, nasturtiums, pansies, petunias, peonies, Begonias, zinnias and others.

The Indian pageant "Hiawatha" will be presented at the ball park each evening. Additional seats and floodlights have been added for the show which is to be presented by a troupe of approximately 60 Indians from Warm Springs reservation. Admission: \$1 for adults, 50 cents for children.

Livestock and crops will be very much in evidence. Providing fairgoers an opportunity to see what Washington county produces. Classifications for Jerseys, Guernseys, Holsteins and Brown Swedes, swine, sheep, poultry, rabbits, field corn, forage crops, potatoes, etc., are included. Cooking exhibits will also play a prominent part.
