

Junior Red Cross Girls Tell About Training Camp

Jean Kennelly, Hillsboro, Nora Lee Craven, Forest Grove, and Irene Vankoski of Beaverton, Junior Red Cross representatives of the Washington County Red Cross chapter, writing home from Camp Celio Nevada City, California, report that in spite of a heavy study schedule at the Junior Red Cross Student Leaders' camp, they are finding time for the informal exchange of ideas and experiences with students from other chapters. Ninety-seven boys and girls, representing five states and 56 Red Cross chapters, begin and end with 6:30 a. m. reveille, and follow a daily schedule of classes in first aid, water safety, accident prevention, home nursing, nutrition, and work on the various aspects of Junior Red Cross organization and program, with lights out at 9:30 p. m. The classes are interspersed with supervised swimming and recreation and excellent meals, including mid-morning and mid-afternoon "snacks," according to a letter received by Mrs. Zola E. Morgan, county chairman Junior Red Cross.

The camp faculty is composed of fifteen national and chapter members who have specialized in the various phases of the Junior Red Cross program which they are teaching. The student body is divided into five groups, each group working on some "special project" in addition to general instruction on organization and Red Cross courses. These groups rotate in taking responsibility for the operation of the camp for the entire day, including the publication of a camp paper and an evening campfire program of music, stunts, movies, and addresses by visitors from National Headquarters and the U. S. Forestry service.

Jean Kennelly states that Oregon has the greatest number of representatives there excepting California. She states there are 16 from Oregon. Jean said she had never thought about Junior Red Cross before, but now she is quite interested in doing it.

Washington County Red Cross chapter is fortunate in having three girls so very interested in their first Leadership Training camp.

Former Internee Of Japanese to Talk at Bethany

Rev. Paul D. Friederichsen, who with his wife and two sons recently returned to this country from the Santo Tomas internment camp in Manila, is to be guest speaker at Bethany Baptist church on Friday, August 30, at 8 p. m. Rev. Friederichsen will show slides and a 40-minute reel of colored moving pictures.

When the war broke out the Friederichsens were missionaries under the Association of Baptists for World Evangelism in Iloilo on the island of Panay which is located about 300 miles south of Manila. They spent the first six months of the war with Japan hiding far back in the mountain jungles of Panay Island but when the American and Filipino soldiers were ordered to surrender they were interned by the Japanese. Thus from June, 1942, until June, 1943, they were imprisoned in Iloilo internment camp along with about one hundred other allied nationals. From this camp they were transferred to Santo Tomas internment camp in Manila and were there confined for another long year and seven months. Their release finally came on February 3rd by MacArthur's forces. Numbers of the internees died of starvation before they were liberated, they say.
