

City Recreational Planning Discussed At Meeting of State Association

Various aspects of setting up city recreation programs were discussed at a meeting of the Oregon state health, physical education and recreation association at Peninsula park in Portland last Thursday. Three from Hillsboro attended the "day of recreational planning." They were Reid Cottrell, representing the local Lions club, Mrs. W. R. Gabelman, P.T.A. and Jim Davis, new Hills football and basketball coach.

Walter May, chairman of the recreation committee of the Oregon council of civilian defense, said it is as necessary for each city to have a recreation program now as it was to have U.S.O.s and other such agencies during the war. He said such a program can do much to combat delinquency.

Such a program should carry on its curriculum such things as physical activities, nature contacting and crafts, gardening, music, drama, rhythmic, science, hobbies, social recreation, linguistic arts and social and community arts and

others, the speakers pointed out. The program would be for the benefit of persons of all ages.

May advocated a paid director for the community, financed by the city, probably through taxes on a regular budget basis. It was pointed out that such a city recreation program must start with backing of the general public. The director would be responsible both to the city and to the people.

J. L. Franzen, city manager of Oregon City, gave a history of development of such a program in his city. He said it became highly successful after being made a part of the city budget and handled on an organized and supervised basis.

It was pointed out that much use could be made of school facilities and at a great saving of money since the school buildings and equipment are in use only part of the time. One speaker said the schools could be reimbursed by a continuing levy.
