

Logging Roads Closed During Hunting Season

Closure of virtually all national forests in Oregon has been lifted but some of the forested area in Washington, Yamhill and Tillamook counties is still closed to hunters, according to a state game commission announcement.

Logging operators, including the Carlton Logging company and Stinson Logging company in Washington and Yamhill counties, report that all roads entering their operations will be closed to public travel during the deer hunting season. A large part of the Tillamook burn is thus barred to hunters.

It was announced that logging roads extending from the closure at Pike, Cherry Grove and Scoggins valley will be closed to all public travel.

The commission bulletin states that private logging roads are being heavily used by logging equipment and operators feel it would be hazardous to open the roads to the public. The operators also state that much valuable equipment has been stolen in previous logging seasons. Most of the burn area north of Scoggins valley is closed to all hunting by game commission regulations. The southeast corner of the closure is located at Scoggins creek, CCC camp and the Willamette base line.

Two Injured in Auto Smash-up

George E. Rogers, 56, and his wife, Kate, 61, who live east of Hillsboro, were taken to Jones hospital for treatment of injuries sustained when their car went over the bank and rolled over several times after being hit by an auto driven by Frank Price Recob, 50, of Portland, a short distance west of the Rock Creek bridge east of Hillsboro.

Both were treated for shock. Mr. Rogers had a lacerated arm and his wife a cut head and other possible injuries. The pair were thrown through the top of their 1934 Chevrolet coach. Recob was uninjured. Officer E. Herder of the state police said the Rogers car pulled out onto the highway in front of the other vehicle in leaving Chuck & Don's Service Station. Both cars were eastbound. Recob, who was traveling an estimated 45 miles an hour, according to Herder, swerved to the left in an attempt to miss the Rogers car but hit it on the rear with the right front wheel of his car. The other car, Chevrolet, which finished on its wheels next to the railroad track, was virtually demolished.

In the words of your slogan, our press is the 'Voice of freedom—guardian of liberty.' Upon it now rests a tremendous share of the responsibility for solving the problems of peace. I know well that this responsibility will be met in full."

Firemen and policemen saw joint duty Saturday evening at Rock Creek Tavern near Hillsboro. It all started when eastbound cars driven by Elmer M. Anderson and Edward Horace Hart of Aloha tangled when the latter started to pass the former.

en. Laird then spun over right tackle and cut back to the two as the quarter ended, setting the stage for Hilhi's first touchdown.

Trucky open-field running by Laird set up the second Spartan score midway in the second period. Taking a punt on the Milwaukie 35, he streaked down the left sidelines and cut inside before being nailed on the 15.

On the next play, Laird fired a pass to Doyle on the left and the Spartan halfback went over from a few yards out. Attempted place-kicks by Pat Hurley after each touchdown failed.

The Maroons wasted little time getting their first touchdown in the third period, marching 39 yards the second time they got possession of the ball.

Seven completed passes out of as many tries on 12 plays by Doyle on the pitching end gave Milwaukie its touchdown. The Maroons piled up four first downs on the march. The point-producer came with the ball on Hilhi's 27 when Left End Fred Loder took a pass on the 10 and scampered over the line.

Hilhi took the kickoff but was forced to punt and Milwaukie took over on its own 45. And from that point the Maroons drove to their second score, using six running plays and five passes, making good on all but one.

The third quarter ended with Milwaukie on the 21, just as Dyer had shovel-passed to Stephens for a nine-yard gain.

Dyer bucked for one yard and a first down on the 20. Substitute Left End Fred Loder then spilled the Maroons for a 10-yard loss but Dyer came back with a six-yard gain and right end on a fake pass. He followed that with a case down the middle to Stephens good to the Hilhi 10 for a first down.

On the next play, Dyer passed to Loder who was wide open in the left flat and he dashed the few remaining yards to score. The attempted kick was no good. Score: Hilhi 12, Milwaukie 13.

Two plays later with the ball on the 40, Laird passed to Doyle and it was good for 13 yards and a first down on the 27. Laird then hit right tackle and cut back for 12 yards more and another first down on the 15.

Hennings smacked right guard for seven yards to the eight. A Hilhi offside put the ball back on the 13, but with second down the Laird Doyle duo clicked in the air for the touchdown. End Dave Ehler took a fake kick and Hilhi had a 19-0-13 lead with only six minutes to go.

The Maroons moved from their 10 to the Hilhi 36 on several more completed passes but the Spartans made eight on downs on the 35 after several desperate heaves failed to connect.

The Spartans were back on their 23 after three running plays but the game ended.

Coach Jim Davis' crew out-charged the Maroons in the first half and showed vast improvement in blocking and tackling over the previous week. The Spartans ended in good performances. Hilhi's defense worked effectively against Milwaukie's running attack through most of the game but failed to solve the Maroon passes down the middle in the second half.

Dick Walbel, Jack Shearer, Terry Christensen and Wally Sigler turned in particularly good performances in the line and Laird, Henn-

ing and Doyle were standouts in the backfield.

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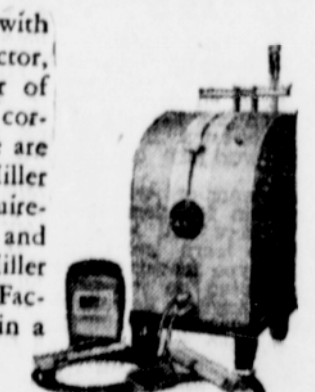


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
