

Cherry Grove Men Return from Trip to Sweden

CHERRY GROVE—Swan Nyberg and Carl Olson are being greeted by families and friends on their return Saturday from two month's trip to Sweden. They left Cherry Grove August 10 and traveled to New York by train, crossing the continent in four days. They flew from New York to Stockholm, Sweden, on the Swedish plane "Sila" in 20 hours. They made one stop in New Foundland. There were 33 passengers on the plane.

Mr. Nyberg went to Boden in Northern Sweden and Mr. Olson visited his mother, sisters and brothers and other relatives. It was his first visit home since coming to America. Mr. Olson made one visit to his home 17 years ago. He visited at Jantland with his mother, two brothers and six sisters and other relatives and friends. He arrived home in time to help with the harvesting of grain and potatoes.

The weather was beginning to get very cold, freezing at night, before they left Sweden. The Swedish people have plenty of food. It is all rationed but they have plenty of all kinds. They get over four pounds of sugar a person per month. Clothing is plentiful although prices are high.

Mr. Nyberg and Mr. Olson left Sweden October 7 by plane for New York. Stops were made in Oslo, Norway, Ireland and Newfoundland. The trip to New York took 26 hours. They finished their trip home by train. There was snow in New Foundland and in the Dakotas and in the Rocky Mountains. The men enjoyed their trip both ways.

Mr. and Mrs. Perry Swanson of Woodbury, N. J., visited with Mr. Olson and Mr. Nyberg in New York both times they stopped there.

Mr. and Mrs. Harry Williams have a new Chevrolet pick-up. They are working at Eugene.

Mr. and Mrs. B. Crosby from Port Angeles, Wash., visited with Mr. and Mrs. W. C. Gossett Sunday. He is stationed at Tillamook for a month.

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Service News

Dawson Given Unit Citation
Clenn Eugene Dawson of Hillsboro has been awarded the Presidential Unit Citation with star for his part in heroism displayed by crew of the U.S.S. Hornet in action against enemy Japanese forces in the Pacific war area.

The citation was for service during the period of March 29, 1944, to June 10, 1945, when the vessel operated in the Marianas, Bonins, Yap, Philippines, Palau, Ryukyu, Formosa and China Sea.

It reads, in part: "Operating continuously in the most forward areas, the U.S.S. Hornet and her air groups struck crushing blows toward annihilating Japanese fighting power; they provided air cover for our amphibious forces; they fiercely countered the enemy's aerial attacks and destroyed his planes; and they inflicted terrific losses on the Japanese in fleet and merchant marine units sunk or damaged. During and dependable in combat, the Hornet and her gallant officers and men rendered loyal service in achieving the ultimate defeat of the Japanese Empire."

Enlistments in Army Increase

The Oregon district U. S. army recruiting headquarters again broke the daily record of enlistments Saturday, October 5, by swearing in 161 voluntary enlistments.

One of the main reasons for the large number of enlistments in the past few weeks, according to Sgt. Robert Christensen of the Oregon district recruiting service, is that men were signing up prior to midnight, October 5, in order to get the full benefits of the G. I. bill of rights. Sgt. Christensen further stated that after October 5 the G. I. bill of rights is still in effect but benefits only accrue as long as the present emergency lasts.

The total number of men enlisted from October 1 to 5, inclusive, was 347.

Army Officer Corps Strength Increased

The war department has announced that approximately 70,000 applicants for regular army commissions under the first integration program earlier this year are being notified they are under consideration for the additional vacancies existing under congressional action authorizing an increase in the regular army officer corps strength from 25,000 to 50,000.

It was also disclosed that on a date to be announced, additional applications for commissions will be accepted. Those who qualify under a processing program paralleling that employed to select an initial increase of 8,000 officers late in June will be added to the consideration list and given equal opportunity on the basis of qualifications with those already listed.

Newsprint Ceilings Lifted Sixth Time

Newsprint ceiling prices went up \$10 a ton Friday, but OPA turned down publishers' appeals for complete decontrol of this material on which newspapers are printed.

Newsprint is still very scarce and makes it necessary for publishers to restrict the number of pages.

This increase was the sixth in newsprint ceilings under OPA controls and lifted prices to \$84 a ton, compared with an original ceiling of \$50. It is more than 100 per cent over what it was ten years ago.

line until by the time it reaches the consumer it would be 12 per cent or more, according to the Portland writer. It would encourage people to go across the river to Vancouver or to buy from mail order houses to escape paying the tax resulting in driving up the Oregon economy, declared Watson.

The speaker expressed confidence that the people of Oregon would use sane judgment when they go to the polls in November and vote against this threat to the welfare of the state. This measure, he said, is the most vital thing before the Oregon voter this year for it touches the home and the future of everyone.

Paul Patterson, who was proponent of the measure, said that while the measure could be repealed by a vote of the people when found for its effect might be lasting in the loss of markets.
