

Control of Congress Won In Republican Upsurge

Republicans in a comeback of landslide proportions, won control of both house and senate of the 80th congress in Tuesday's general election, which overturned the Democrats for the first time in 15 years. Riding a tide of protest votes from citizens who gave evidence of having "had enough" of Democratic direction of the nation's legislative machinery, the Republicans swept to their first major victory since losing power in the depression days.

The result means a congress meeting in January politically divided from the White House. With 296 house seats decided, the G.O.P. had 224 seats clinched and the Democrats 173. A majority is 218. Republicans were assured 51 of 98 senate seats.

Former President Herbert Hoover, in a election statement, said the U. S. is "in the first country to repudiate the totalitarian road of planned economy." Socialism is Communism and that it defines the Republican party as the party of the right. "We are again moving toward the goal of free men."

Ban Closed Shops
Proposal to ban the closed shop won substantial majorities from voters in Nebraska, South Dakota

and Arizona. Union leaders announced promptly that they would fight application of the laws.

PLDs Turned Down
All eight Oregon public utility district proposals were being defeated.

Price Given U. N. Chance
The governing committee of the United Nations assembly Tuesday approved a United States proposal to widen the permanent site question to include consideration of New York City and San Francisco.

OPA End Seen
Complete liquidation of the OPA before the end of the week was predicted in Washington Monday. The OPA Thursday night ordered its 1942 local boards to close up shop November 4 and pushing out with decontrol took ceilings and other orders.

Blizzard Takes Six Lives
Six persons were dead in Denver Saturday and transportation facilities used by a great volume of its residents were virtually paralyzed as a blizzard of 38 hours duration continued with almost 20 inches of snow.

Deadline Given On Reinstating G.I. Insurance

Veterans who have permitted their national service life insurance to lapse have just three months in which to reinstate it without a physical examination, the veterans administration has warned.

The deadline was set for February 1, 1947, in a liberalized insurance law enacted last August and cannot be changed without an act of congress. For that reason, all veterans who visit VA contact offices are being warned of the approaching deadline and advised to reinstate while no physical examination is necessary.

A survey has shown that most veterans lapse their NSLI policies because they do not understand the benefits. For instance, some have complained that they do not want to keep their insurance because their widow cannot get a lump-sum settlement, because the monthly payments to their widow would be too small, or because they cannot name the beneficiary they prefer. All these objections have been overcome under the new insurance law, the VA pointed out.

In a recent spot check of 682 veterans who visited one office, it was discovered that 60 per cent of their insurance had been allowed to lapse. After the insurance was explained to them, 89 per cent of the lapsed insurance was reinstated.

During the next three months, all that a veteran has to do to reinstate his term insurance is to pay two months' premiums and to certify that he is in as good health as when his policy lapsed.

Driver Training For Schools Set

A high school course in driver training will be available soon and will be available at high school with the approval of the state department of public instruction, according to Secretary of State Robert S. Farwell Jr.

The course consists of eight units and was prepared as a joint project of the secretary of state's office, the state department of public instruction, the Portland public schools and the Oregon State Teachers' association.

The course now is in the hands of the printer and is expected to be ready for distribution late in November, Farwell said.

"Traffic authorities long have believed that driver education at training at the high school level is one of the most important factors in traffic accident prevention," Farwell said. "The president's highway safety conference held in May, listed driver training programs in high schools as one of the principal points in its national program."

"A recent study in the city of Cleveland, where high school driver training has been in existence for many years, indicated that high school graduates who had taken

the course had 50 per cent fewer accidents than graduates who had not taken the course. Oregon high schools now have an opportunity to offer modern, scientific training in motor vehicle operation to the young drivers of Oregon."

Farwell said the course, which had been approved by the state department of public instruction for supplementary use in Oregon high schools, has been approved by all national agencies interested in driver training, such as the American Automobile association, the National Conservation bureau, the Center for Safety Education of New York university, and the National Safety council.

The eight units of instruction in the course cover the social, economic and political effects of the motor vehicle; physical, mental and emotional characteristics of related to the safe operation of a motor vehicle; Oregon laws regulating traffic on the highways and streets; driver and pedestrian attitudes, privileges, financial responsibilities and courtesies; natural laws and mechanical principles as related to the operation of a motor vehicle; principles of the internal combustion engine and the motor vehicle; map reading and interpretation of road signs and behind-the-wheel instruction.

Strawberry Root Rot Prevention Discussed

The three best methods so far found of preventing loss from strawberry root rot are to get clean planting stock, plant it as soon after taking as possible, and then use a crop rotation system that keeps strawberries from following crops that complicate the root problem.

Latest report on root rot, contained in a circular of information No. 292 prepared jointly by the departments of horticulture, plant pathology and soils.

AFTER-THE-GAME BUFFET SUPPER
Cups of Hot Chili, Stuffed with Smoked Turkey, Chopped with Smoked Cheese, Corn or Potato Chips with Guacamole, Hops, Onion and Carrot Sticks. Serve in the living room while last minute touches are added to the supper.

GUACAMOLE—Best if made just before serving, but it takes only a minute. Cut a medium-size avocado in half, remove seed, peel, and save. Season with 2 tablespoons grated onion, 1 teaspoon salt, a tablespoon of salad dressing or mayonnaise. Mix well. Serve with crackers or as a dunking mixture for corn or potato chips.

LIMA BEAN AND HAM CASSEROLE—Rolls—Make this in the morning or the day before. Reheat just before serving. Soak 3 cups dried lima beans in 8 cups water overnight. Add a 2 to 2 1/2 pound piece ham shoulder or shank end and simmer until beans are tender. Remove ham from bones and cut in cubes. Drain beans and combine them in a 3-quart casserole with 2 chopped sweet red peppers, 2 tablespoons butter, 1 teaspoon dry mustard and ham cubes. Pour 3 cups cooked tomatoes over beans and bake in moderate oven (375° F.) for 2 hours. Serve generously.

BUFFET SALAD PLATTER—Make salad in the morning, cover with acid paper and place in refrigerator until serving time. On a large platter arrange around a cooled, chilled head of cauliflower alternate groups of cucumber slices, tomato slices, and bundles of asparagus stripped with pimiento. Serve with French or Thousand Island Dressing.
