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Eighty Men and Women Taking Scout Training

Eighty men and women from many communities turned out for the first meeting of the Tualatin District training course for "Scouters" and "Cubbers" recently in the Beaverton grade school.

Cub dens and scout patrols and troops were organized on the same plan as the boy's clubs are conducted. Six dens were formed with the following men as den chiefs: Thomas Sheridan, Multnomah; Robert Mullen and Harold Wooley, Mapleton; A. N. Wetterberg, Paul Knepp and E. T. Morgan, Beaverton; Therman R. Evans, Mapleton; and the scoutmaster with assistant scoutmasters, D. S. Hendrickson, Cedar Mill, and J. E. Robinson, Beaverton. Twenty-four women interested in den mother work registered for the course.

Three Scout patrols were formed with the following patrol leaders: Donald Ballard, Sherwood; Russ Nelson, Hillsboro, and Berle Garlick, Forest Grove. J. D. McIntyre, Multnomah, will be scoutmaster and his assistants are W. H. Kent and Harry Hanson, Beaverton, and E. H. Lehman, Hillsboro.

This training course, organized by M. M. Romie, chairman of leadership training in the Tualatin district communities, will run for several more weeks. It is for all adults engaged in work with Cub Scouts, Boy Scouts and Senior Scouts. The training course staff is made up of local men assisted by Byron Walker, field executive for Washington county, and J. E. Monroe, scout executive in charge of leadership training for the Portland Area Council.

The course is still open for registration and will meet each Wednesday at 7:45 p. m.

Charles Munford Given Promotion

The promotion of Charles W. Munford to Lieutenant Colonel Engineer reserve has been announced by the war department, according to Washington Chapter Reserve Officers Assn.

Lt. Colonel Munford served 63 months in the army. He spent 31 months in the South Pacific. His tour of duty took him from New Caledonia to Leyte where he was hospitalized and subsequently returned to the states. He has five battle stars for Pacific campaigns. He has letters of commendation signed by Gen. Harmon, Col. Baird and Col. Kendall for his "loyalty, co-operation, display of professional skill and comprehensive grasp of engineering problems."

At the present time Lt. Col. Munford is employed by the Alcoa Mining Company at Hillsboro.

Stitzer Honored With UO War Dead

Louis Kent Stitzer of Forest Grove is one of 10 University of Oregon men killed in action in the last war who are to be commemorated on the campus when name plaques go up for the 10 units of the two big student-veteran dormitories.

The new units will bear the names of 10 of the 218 university students known to be killed in action in World War II. Stitzer was a second lieutenant in the army air corps when he was killed in a plane crash off the coast of Venezuela, April 12, 1942. Stitzer had been unit A, as a result of a drawing held at Eugene.

County Students Attend School At Walla Walla

Blenkinson served with the famous 41st division during World War II. Music for the occasion will be furnished by the Legion band. Donald Hite will sing a vocal solo.

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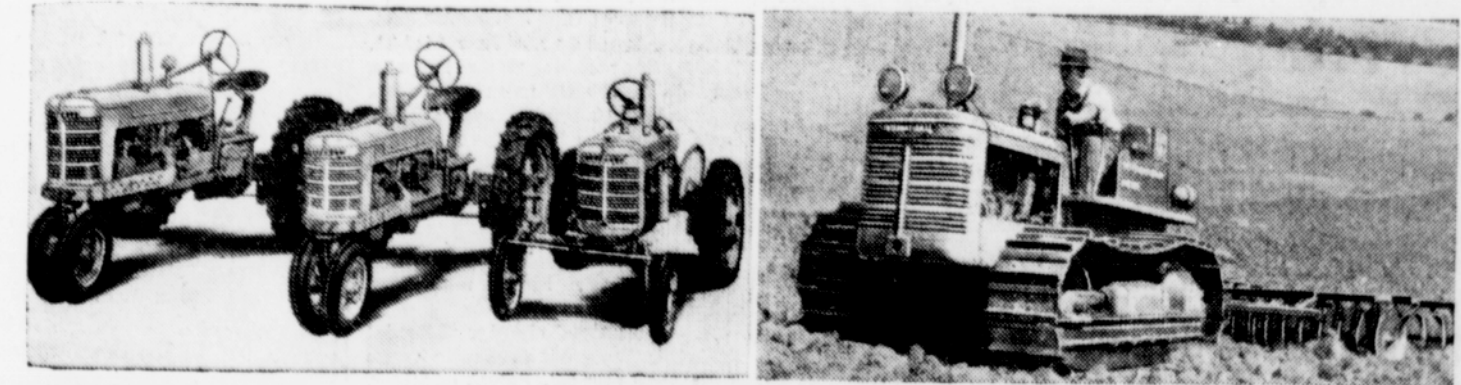
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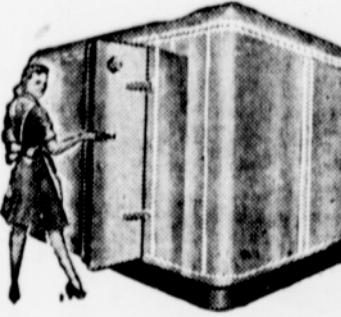
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
