Housing Situation Desperate for Vets

Plans for housing of any kind—single rooms, apartments, etc. for war veterans was issued this week by Dolph Stuart, county service officer. Several could have jobs locally if they could find a place to stay and would be satisfied with "anything," he said.

Other war veterans have filed for permanent jobs such as truck driving, sheet metal work, cold storage warehousemen, refrigeration and for electrician's work. Others want only short-time work until starting at college.

Report of Stuart to the county court shows 44 contacts for October. 31 more than the previous month. Forms-filled-out total was 14, a gain of 36 and 97 letters were placed on behalf of county war vets for a gain of 25 over September. Twenty-six were placed on behalf of 81 applications and 31 were placed on behalf of 144 applications. Three dental and two maternal cases were handled. Ten pensions were granted out of 25 applications.
