Badgers Swamp Thunderbirds by 31-to-0 Margin

Stan Russell, left half, passed the Pacific university Badger riders to a 31-to-0 victory over the University of British Columbia in their final game of the 1946 season on the Forest Grove field Friday night.

Pacific scored once in each of the first three periods and added two more touchdowns and a conversion in the final quarter. Russell passed for four touchdowns, connecting twice with Ed Francis Brusco in the end zone, once with Quarterback Allan Olson and once with Right Half Bill Taylor.

First touchdown came on a plunge by Fullback Gene Sprinkle

from the one-foot line. Pacific had taken possession of the ball a few moments earlier after a bad punt went out of bounds on the Thunderbird 19. Passes from Russell to Brusco accounted for Pacific's second and third touchdowns.

A dead man play was used for the fourth score. Olson taking Russell's pass on the 23 and going over center. Willard Anderson kicked for the extra point. An 11-yard pass from Russell to Bill Taylor accounted for the final score.

son who received it on about the 23 and he rambled to the 12 for a first down. Two plays later, Laird tackled the Beaverton line on a 14-yard cutback off his own right tackle. Laird made it a first down with less than a yard to go for a touchdown. A line back failed to produce the score and Hibi was then penalized to the six to set the stage for the touchdown.

The Beavers took the next kick-off on their own 17, however, and drove 53 yards to try dirt to again take the lead, using a three first downs along the way. The clincher came with the ball almost on to the Hills 18 when O'Connor heaved a touchdown pass to Harvey down the middle. The attempted line play for extra point was no good. Beaverton 22, Hills 7.

That score came in the last moments of play of the first half and it looked as though the Spartans were doomed to go to the dressing room behind the 14-22 score. But Laird then provided one of the games big thrills when he rambled around right end on a lateral pass to the Hills 20. He drove the kick-off and faced 39 yards to score. Heaving again, he kicked Hills 14, Beaverton 12. Beaverton had time to complete one pass after the kick-off by Jerry Davis intercepted the next aerial thrust and the half ended two plays later with Hills on the Beaver 47.

Moments after the second half opened, Beaverton had its third touchdown on a neat run by John Thomas and Hibi never again got ahead of the Beavers. Hibi kicked off to Thomas and he ran the ball from the 12 back to the 33. He then took the ball off his own right tackle and went all the way, 82 yards, to score. A last desperate tackle by a Spartan spilled Thomas but he was already over the goal line. Ross bucked over for the extra point. Beaverton 19, Hills 14.

The score remained that way until the fourth quarter. The Spartans always provided a threat to come from behind for the third time. But finally with about five minutes to go the Beavers were on the Hills 20. They drove there from their own 35 where they held the Spartans for downs.

O'Connor fired another pass to Harvey near the left sidelines on about the five. He went around several potential tacklers, cutting inside to go over the goal line about midway between the side-lines. The try for point failed. Beaverton 25, Hills 14.

Beaverton shortly thereafter drove to the Hills 18 but the Spartans appeared to be making a successful stand when an unnecessary roughness penalty gave the Beavers a first down. O'Connor heaved another pass to Harvey down the middle, two plays later from the seven for the final touchdown. The attempted line back failed. Final score: Beaverton 31, Hills 14.

at 140. Davis next at 143 and Laird fourth at 148. Huschka is heaviest of the backs at 190 pounds.

While on the subject of poundage we might as well take the totals of the probable starting lineups. Forest Grove averages 189 and Hills 167, a difference of 22 pounds per man. All of which we're sure won't frighten the Spartans one bit as the Viking heaves have been walked over by lighter outfits already this season and presumably can again.

Did you know that Hillsboro once had a prep football team rated as one of the best in the state. It was the 1921 eleven coached by B. M. Goodie. Goodman, the samegent who now turns out the strong American Legion Junior baseball team here. This outfit beat Forest Grove, 30 to 2, to win the Willamette Valley title and had a record of 171 points scored as against only 14 for the opposition.

Goodman's Spartans were unscored upon in five games and posted victories over Molalla, Greenacres, Albany, Newberg, Tillamook, and Oregon City, in addition to Forest Grove. L. H. Gregory, sports editor of The Oregonian here, as it is now, commented "Hillsboro certainly has as good a claim as any to the state championship."
