County Farm Credit Needs Now Under Home Administration Office

All Washington county farm credit needs formerly taken care of by the farm security administration and the emergency crop and feed loan program will now be served through county farmers' home administration office, courthouse, Hillsboro, announces Victor S. Madson, interim county FHA supervisor, who returned Saturday from a three-day state conference at Bend. Madson was county FSA supervisor up to November 1.

The farmers' home administration is authorized to make annual seed and feed loans as well as longer-time loans with farm and home plans for purchase of needed

livestock, equipment, farm operating goods and "subsistence." Madson said, "Forty-year farm ownership loans and special water facility loans are also continued under FHA. Formerly actually a former farm home administration office, courthouse, Hillsboro, announces Victor S. Madson, interim county FHA supervisor, who returned Saturday from a three-day state conference at Bend. Madson was county FSA supervisor up to November 1.

Production and operating loan limits, formerly \$2500 under FSA and \$400 under ECFL, are set at \$500 for initial loans in any one year of a total indebtedness of not over \$500, including principal and interest, Madson explained. These loans cannot run more than five years and interest remains at five per cent. The interest rate on former farm ownership loans is raised from three to three and one-half per cent and broader authorities are given for farm development and improvements. Water facility loan terms are unchanged.

"County farmers' home committees, consisting of three members, two of whom must be farmers, will continue to advise on eligibility of applicants' loan applications, as they did under FSA," said Madson. "Members of county FHA committee are Chester Wehler, Rinehart Hornecker, and Mrs. William Putnam."

Applicants for FHA loans and former FSA and ECFL borrowers may secure detailed information on the new program at the county office every Wednesday at the courthouse, Hillsboro.

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Good Pasture Effective in Reducing Amount of Grain Used in Feeding Hog

Even though the hog is not designed for eating grass, good pasture can be used to excellent advantage in reducing the amount of grain required in putting on 100 pounds of pork, says Palmer S. Townsend, county agent.

A number of local swine growers have been developing and using pastures for hog production with excellent results. Albert Greenow of Hillsboro has been pasturing hogs on irrigated Latino clover, English ryegrass and alfalfa. He has also used the annual ryegrass and alfalfa. He has included a subterranean clover in his pasture. Good legume pasture will reduce by 25 to 30 per cent the amount of grain required per pound of pork produced, he stated.

According to H. A. Lindgren, extension animal husbandman of Oregon State college, growing pigs should receive two pounds of grain daily per hundred pounds live weight when on good pasture. At the latter part of the feeding period it is advisable to increase the
