Postman Will Call On November 25

This year in Oregon more Christmas letters containing sheets of Christmas Seals will go out in the mail than ever before. More people will be asked to share in the work of the program to wipe out tuberculosis in Oregon.

More people than ever before will buy and use Christmas Seals as evidence that they appreciate the task ahead of us and wish to do their part.

Thousands of volunteer workers are now busy preparing letters for the mail. They are the men and women and children who love the spirit of the Lamplighter depicted on the Seal and want to help spread the message of the Double-Barred Cross.

The letters themselves tell why the Christmas Seal sale this year is important. We need the dollars asked for? From the letters we find these answers: To carry the message of how to prevent tuberculosis; to make chest X-ray service available to all people; to make sure our children do not have tuberculosis and to teach how they, when they reach maturity, can prevent tuberculosis in their communities.

Tuberculosis is still a problem in Oregon. Christmas Seal money helps solve that problem.

Last year, 271 persons died in Oregon of tuberculosis. It is possible to prevent a like number from dying this next year, if we can reach them, teach them the facts, and find the disease before it is far advanced.

During 1945, the mobile X-ray unit which is supported by the sale of Christmas Seals gave chest X-rays free of charge to 52,984 persons.

The Christmas Seal sale is the answer to the question: Will we wipe out tuberculosis? Washington county always has met its quota for Christmas Seal sale. It will again.
