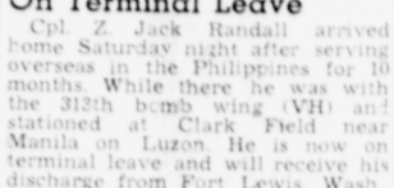

A total of 227 full-time chaplains are on duty in BA hospitals.

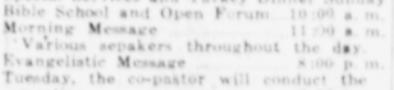
