

Washington County Logs to Be Used For Large Building Contract in South

A Washington county firm, Lee Structures, Inc., of Forest Grove, will play a part in the building of at least 1,500 log houses in the southwest and Mexico during the next five years as the result of a contract announced Sunday by the company.

The firm will complete an expansion of at least \$100,000 as a direct result of the contract. It was revealed. A \$2,500,000 contract with D. Arthur Lowe, former Oregonian heading the Lowe company with offices in Los Angeles and San Francisco, was signed, according to Leo D. Freed, vice-president of Lee Structures.

The contract provides that Lowe will take not less than 250 carloads of the Forest Grove Lumber—a patented grooved log—a year for five years, Freed revealed. The contract will gross approximately \$500,000 a year. Each carload will contain enough logs to build six medium-sized homes of 4 1/2 to 3 rooms each.

The logs are actually a half log placed on three sides and grooved on each edge to receive a splint which locks the logs into place and at the same time serves to waterproof the wall. Each log is pre-cut in eight-foot lengths with either mitered ends for corners or square-ended ends.

A four-man crew can erect the log walls of a house in one day, Freed stated. The log type of construction eliminates 1,200 board feet of studs and 1,200 lineal feet of studding and will cut by two-thirds the time required to erect a house, it was stated.

The firm has been using second-growth timber from logged-over land and employs a crew of 15 men, exclusive of loggers, employed by three independent contractors and by January 1 will probably be employing 50 men, not counting office personnel, Freed said.

As a result of the Lowe contract the firm plans to launch a \$100,000 expansion, adding another complete mill to the one it now operates at Gaston. Two portable mills will also be built immediately for use in the woods wherever timber is obtained, Freed stated.

Lowe was described as "greatly impressed" with the new type of log construction and foresees "tremendous sales in California resorts and recreation areas and in medium-priced residential districts." Lowe has already received 123 carloads of the logs, Freed stated.

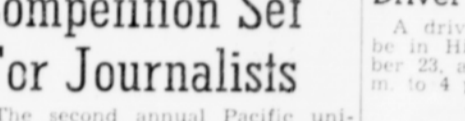

Reduction in Claims of Vets Reported by VA

A continued slight reduction in numbers of claims for veterans compensation and pensions pending before the Veterans Administration's regional office for Oregon was reported by Thomas M. Craig, VA representative for this area.

In October, disability payment cases awaiting adjudication were whittled from 763 to 759, despite receipts of 449 new applications. Death pension cases still pending were reduced to 44 from September's 54, Craig pointed out.

In this state 22,177 veterans of the two World Wars are receiving federal disability compensation, while in 2,449 cases death pensions or compensation are being paid to veterans' survivors.

Hospitalization was requested in October through the VA regional office by 139 ex-servicemen and women, a slight reduction from September, and all requests were cleared during the month, Craig added.

Craig meets with veterans each Thursday afternoon in the city hall at Hillsboro.
