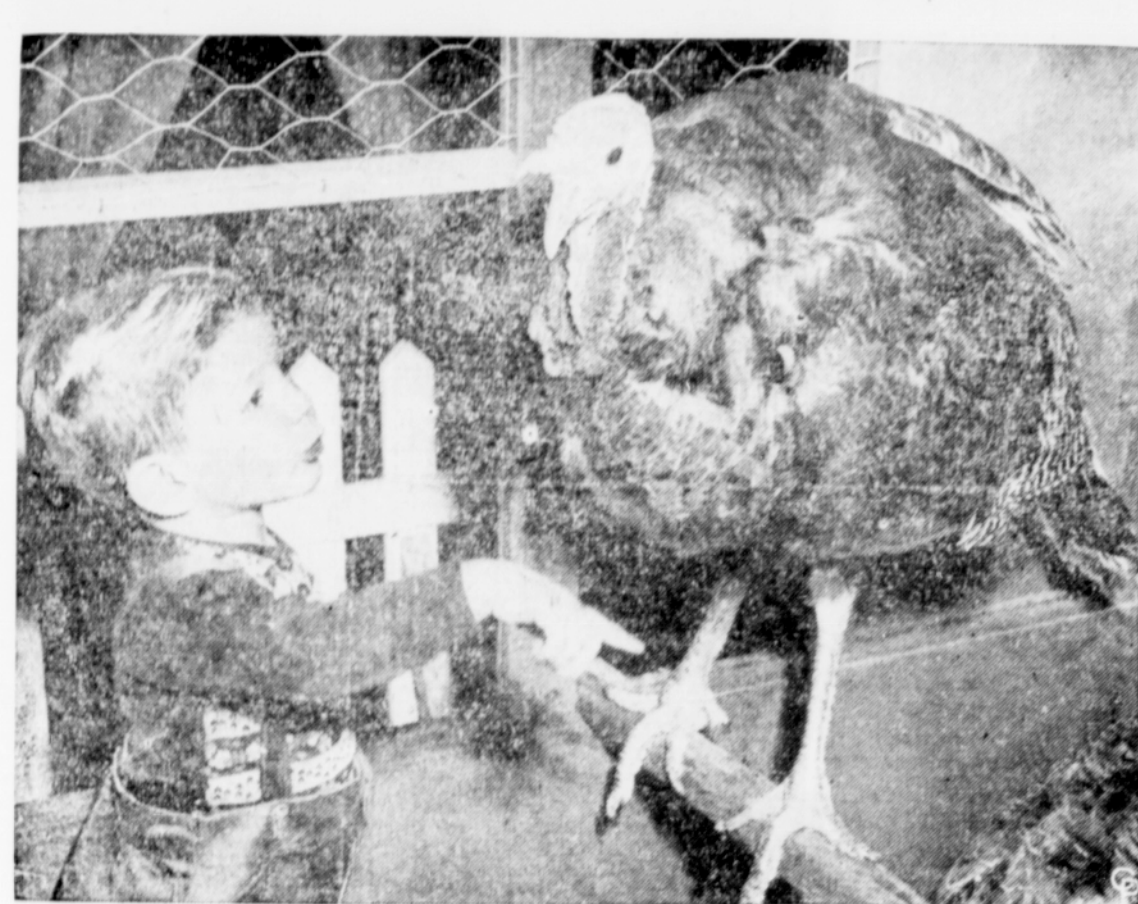
In addition, scouts receive a complimentary ticket for each 10 tickets sold and the scout units receive a percentage of the amount sold by the group.

people, but he found that the Soviet government forbids friendships with foreigners. He declared that he was not anti-Russian speaking of the people, but that there is a great difference between the people and the government. There is much secrecy and suspicion on the part of the Red government and the Kremlin's fear of the people is great, asserted Moorad, who held that there was little chance of a change unless there is a complete overthrow of the government. He said that it has been estimated that there is an annual turnover of 1,000,000 political prisoners. Belief was expressed that the people would change their government if they could.

Ernest Haycox of Portland, famed Oregon author, will be the speaker next Tuesday noon. Mervin Brink introduced Moorad.

Attendance at Tuesday's election was the greatest in a period of 20 years, according to Secretary Ed. L. Moore.

Careful Driving Urged by Farrell

Secretary of State Robert S. Far-

rell today urged Oregon motorists to prevent accidents by preparing to meet December driving hazards.

Such preparation must include careful check-up of vehicles, running condition and obedience of safe winter driving rules.

With cars now averaging nine or ten years of age, Farrell's police check showed almost half to be in dangerous mechanical condition, Farrell said. "Lights and brakes—the points most essential to winter safety," were the common flaws.

December and late November are the most dangerous times of year in a number of respects. With the longest nights, more travel during

darkness, the year's worst storms, and three of the year's biggest holidays—Thanksgiving, Christmas and New Year—caution is paramount.

"Drive with greater distance between your car and the one in front of you, start early and don't count on making time; beware of frosty spots; and keep your windshield clear," advised Farrell.
