VA Protecting Veterans from Over-pricing

In action aimed at giving veterans increased protection against buying of over-priced real estate, the Veterans Administration has taken over selection of the appraiser for each GI loan, at the same time dropping its former policy of permitting lending agencies to pick any appraiser from the VA-approved panel.

Thomas M. Craig, VA representative here, explained that this tightening of GI loan policy against real estate inflation means that the VA now designates by name the appraiser for each piece of property considered for purchase by a veteran.

Explanatory letters have been sent to 300 lending institutions and to 250 approved appraisers in Oregon. The VA's roster of appraisers has not been changed, except for five earlier dismissals. The new policy, effective since January 2, is expected to halt the tendency of a few lenders to use exclusively the services of certain "obliging" appraisers.

The lending agency now sends its request to the VA's regional office in Portland in a simple letter in duplicate for each appraisal giving the veteran's name and identity of the property. The VA will return one copy after writing in names of its designated appraiser and one alternate.

District Head Rotary Visits

Ivan Stewart of Salem, district governor of Rotary International, made his official visit to the Hillsboro club Thursday evening. He talked on the mechanics of organization and ideals of Rotary.

O.C.E., Pacific Can Take Vets

O.C.E. will take quite a few starting January 18 and Pacific has announced it can take an additional 100 veterans for the spring semester starting January 27.

Labor Federation Planning Contest

Two college scholarships of \$500 each will be awarded by the Oregon State Federation of Labor this school year to senior students in Oregon high schools who rate highest in an examination on the American industrial system and the part which labor organization plays in that system. It has been announced by Miss May Darling, Portland, chairman, standing committee on education of the state federation.

The purpose of the contest, according to Miss Darling, is to stimulate among high school students an objective study of the subject, and not to encourage them to engage in a mere quest of propaganda favorable to organized labor. She said that full approval of the project had been given by Rex Putnam, state superintendent of public instruction.

Any senior, in an accredited high school, is eligible, with no restrictions as to sex, race or student background. The winners will choose their own colleges. Announcement of essential details has been sent to every high school principal in the state. Examinations will be given April 16, 1947, in each district having students in the contest.

Local War Vet Dies in Hospital

Howard Arthur Ferrell, 26, son of Mr. and Mrs. H. A. Ferrell of Hillsboro, died December 15 at the Veterans Hospital, Minneapolis, Minn.

He was born September 22, 1920, in Bemidji, Minn., where he attended elementary and high school. A member of the National Guard, he was mustered into Battery H for services in February, 1941. He left for overseas duty December 1, 1941, served in the South Pacific, and then in the European theatre. Becoming ill in March, 1946, he was hospitalized in Italy. He was flown back to the United States and hospitalized until February, 1946, when he returned to the home of his parents at Hillsboro. In August, 1946, he went to visit his sisters and friends in Bemidji, where he became ill again. He entered the Veterans Hospital in Minneapolis on October 4.

He was a member of the Methodist church of Bemidji and of the Veterans of Foreign Wars and the American Legion. Surviving are his parents, four sisters, Mrs. Lois Huff and Mrs. Barbara Higgins of Bemidji, Mrs. Verna Langlie of Nest Falls, Ontario, and Mrs. Anna Mae Sherwood of Hillsboro; five nephews and two nieces. Funeral services were held December 18 at the Methodist church of Howard Lake, Minn. The V. F. W. and American Legion with the services.

The funeral was attended by the surviving parents and by three of the four sisters, Mrs. Verna Langlie of Nest Falls, Ontario, was unable to attend because of weather conditions.

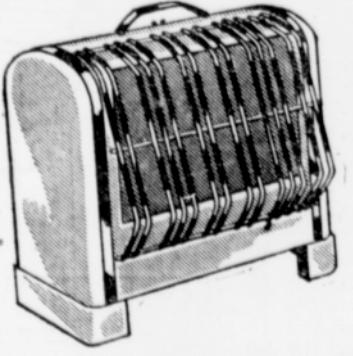
