Deadline February 1 for Vets Reinstate Insurance

The Oregon Department of Veterans' Affairs today reminded World War II veterans that February 1 is the deadline for reinstatement of their national service life insurance without the requirement of a physical examination, and cited the following features of the amended insurance act to encourage the renewal of lapsed policies.

Payment of only two monthly premiums without interest is necessary to reinstate, regardless of how long ago the veteran dropped his insurance.

G. I. insurance is the cheapest on the market.

It pays off in a lump sum to the beneficiary, if the veteran desires.

The veteran can name any one his beneficiary.

The converted policy has cash value after one year.

It can be borrowed on, up to 94 per cent of the cash value.

The veteran has his choice of six policies: Ordinary life, 20-pay life, 30-day life, 20-year endowment, endowment at age 60, and endowment at age 65.

The policy holder who is totally disabled beyond six months may apply for waiver of premium, and as long as he remains disabled his insurance is paid up without cost.

The policy does not contain a war clause or a hazardous occupation clause. It is free from all restrictions as to residence, travel, occupation, or military service.

George E. Sandy, director of veterans' affairs, pointed out that after February 1 G. I. insurance may still be reinstated by payment of only two premiums, but physical examinations will be required.

To reinstate, veterans were advised to go to their nearest Veterans' Administration contact office, to county or veterans' organization service officers, or to the Portland or Salem offices of the Department of Veterans' Affairs.
