

Fire Causes Large Damage At University

Fire of undetermined origin destroyed the large two-story physical plant warehouse that housed university cars, tractors, garden equipment and university supplies Tuesday night. Building and supplies damage was estimated at \$25,000.

Power Ordered Stopped
The British government Friday announced the long-heralded breakdown of the electrical industry was at hand as the result of an unprecedented coal famine, and ordered electric power cut off from factories in the industrial heart of the country beginning Monday.

Great Britain's desperate campaign to build up its dangerously low coal piles proved a failure during the first 24 hours of its operation and the fuel ministry announced it would be necessary to appeal for public response to the appeal for power and coal conservation was "not so good" Britain's severest fuel crisis Wednesday en-

compassed all of England, Scotland and Wales.

Arms Cut Renounced
Secretary of State Marshall Friday ruled out disarmament or reduction of armaments until the peace treaties are signed and approved for a universal military training system to back up American foreign policy.

Protests Any Army Cut
Gen. Eisenhower, chief of staff, Tuesday protested any reduction of army funds that would cripple defense plans.

Chaos In China Nears
Chiang Kai-shek Tuesday asked his leading financial and economic experts for suggestions to end the nation's financial debacle as China neared its end.

See Coal Strike Ahead
The National Coal association warned Tuesday that a new bituminous coal strike is "inevitable" by July 1 unless John L. Lewis agrees to give up the miners' welfare fund or Congress passes a remedial law.

Sharp Division in Court
Dividing sharply on what constitutes government support of religion, the supreme court held 5 to 4 Monday that public law receipts may be used for public transportation to Catholic parochial as well as public schools. The school bus ruling in a New Jersey case af-

fects at least 16 states and the district of Columbia which provide some form of transportation to church-operated schools.

Violence Mars Stinging
The allied signed peace treaties Monday with Italy and four other German allies in a history-making ceremony that the ink was scarcely dry before violence flared in Rome and in Pola, Italian navy bases under Yugoslav control. A British seaman was shot and killed at Pola by an Italian woman and an angry Italian student assaulted the Yugoslav legation at Rome in protest against the Italian pact.

Heavy Postal Pay
The M. C. Clements Pottery company case was thrown out of federal court in Detroit Saturday, but the \$4,000,000 postal pay battle still continued. Judge Frank A. Piard, ruling against postal time for the pottery workers, announced the M. C. Clements case with a denial of damages. The CIO mainly responsible for the avoidance of postal suits across the nation, indicated that the fight would be continued.

House Approves Two-Term Bill
A Republican-sponsored constitutional amendment to restrict presidents to two four-year terms was approved by the house February 6, after a Democratic compromise for a single six-year term had been shouted down. The vote was 285 to 121, more than the two-thirds required to send the proposal to the senate.

Secret Ballot Favored
Harold E. Stassen, who frankly seeks the Republican nomination for president, came up Friday with a proposal to require secret strike votes and walked into a rebuff from Republican Senators Taft of Ohio and Ball of Minnesota.

Opposes Closed Shop
Charles E. Wilson, president of General Motors, told the senate labor committee last week that he would quit his industrial post because he would sign a closed shop union contract.

NLR Scores Strikers
The national labor relations board ruled Monday that workers who strike in violation of a no-strike pledge in their union contracts can be fired without protection of the Wagner act.

Thompson Legal Governor
Governor M. E. Thompson was declared Georgia's legal chief executive in the first court decision directly involving the state's controversial governorship, but Herman Talmadge was not ordered to relinquish his office.

Herman Talmadge was declared Georgia's legal governor Wednesday by Superior Court Judge Walter Hendrix in a suit brought by Governor M. E. Thompson, who challenges Talmadge's right to the office.

Marines Lost
U. S. marines are missing and presumed drowned in the sinking of three amphibious tractors during practice landing operations at Beaufort, N. C., Monday. The craft sank in heavy surf.

Free Press Threatened
J. David Stern, former publisher of the Philadelphia Record, told the house labor committee the CIO newspaper guild is a "cancerous growth that jeopardizes the Hatch Act Upheld."

The supreme court Monday upheld provisions of the Hatch act prohibiting activity by federal workers.

More Sugar
The office of price administration has announced that a bigger sugar allowance is "fairly certain" this year. A new ration stamp — good for 10 pounds — validated on April 1, will go into effect.

Plane Missing
A coast guard plane with six men aboard is believed down in the mountainous Cascade region north of Marysville. A search was organized early Wednesday.

McMinnville Pilot Killed
The body of W. V. LeBlond of McMinnville, Ore., was found late Monday in his wrecked plane near Jerome, Ariz.

Flash Fire Toll High
A marijuana became a holocaust Saturday night when an estimated 100 to 150 masked merry-makers were burned or trampled to death in a flash fire that swiftly engulfed the Karlovi dance hall in the British zone in Berlin.

Fire Melts Washougal Span
A roaring fire, wind-whipped from two wrecked and burning gasoline trucks, so melted the steel girders of the 230-foot Washougal river bridge on the Evergreen highway February 6 that it dropped 25 feet into the water. Collision of a hay truck with the lead gasoline truck in the center of the bridge caused the fire.

Carson Nominated
Joseph W. Carson, ex-mayor of Portland, was nominated by President Truman as a member of the United States maritime commission. It was announced February 6. He was nominated to fill a vacancy created by the expiration of the term served by John Carmody.

Rev. Fenton Reese, a layman friend of the family in Hillsboro, will conduct funeral services.

Mr. Logan was born May 10, 1863, in Illinois. He homesteaded a ranch in Nebraska when a young man and married Hattie M. Hutchinson in Nebraska in 1891. They came to Oregon in 1921 and sold his home in East Hillsboro in 1945. Since that time he had an apartment in Portland. Mrs. Logan died in 1935.

He is survived by four sons: Frank D. Logan, Aurora; LeRoy S. Logan, Alva; J. R. Logan, Hillsboro; and Louis H. Logan, Portland. He has 14 grandchildren and 13 great-grandchildren. Also a sister, Mrs. Pheme Heath, and a brother, James Logan, both of Portland.

Three Types of Accidents Cited

Three types of accidents accounted for 90 per cent of the traffic deaths in Oregon last year, it has been announced by Secretary of State Robert S. Farrell Jr.

"Thirty-three per cent—almost exactly a third of the deaths—were in collisions between automobiles," said Farrell. "Non-collision accidents and hitting fixed objects took another 30 per cent, and pedestrian mishaps 20 per cent."

Non-collision accidents involve only one car which leaves or over-takes in the roadway.

"This breakdown certainly shows us where we have to concentrate our safety efforts," said the secretary of state, noting that less than 11 per cent of the deaths resulted from bicycle, railroad crossing, animal, and unspecified types of accidents.

Most laymen are unaware of the consistently high portion of fatalities rising out of non-collision wrecks. These occur mostly outside city areas and are generally caused by loss of control due to too great speed. Fixing the blame for this type of wreck is usually simple since there is only one driver involved.
