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County Jersey Cattle Club Sets Meeting, Sale

The Washington county Jersey Cattle club will hold its March meeting on Thursday, March 20, at the home of Mr. and Mrs. Lloyd Knox, Star route, Forest Grove.

Location of the farm is one mile west of Forest Grove on the Gales Creek road, across from the N. W. Fire Patrol station. A pot-luck lunch will be served at noon. All members and friends are invited to attend.

The main topic for discussion will be the management of registered Jersey heifers on March 22 at Hillsboro fair grounds, sponsored by the Washington county Jersey Cattle club.

To date there are 23 heifers entered in the sale from neighboring counties, ranging in age from two months to two years from classified and registered dams averaging 400 lbs. of fat or better.

Col. J. W. Hughes of Forest Grove will cry the sale. A. H. Aids of Hillsboro will clerk and Anton Molar of Sandy, will assist in the ring. The sale is limited to 4-H and F.F.A. members only. However, all Jersey members and friends are invited to attend.

Landscaping Meeting Set

Landscaping the farm home is the subject to be discussed by Ralph Clarke, extension horticulturist, Oregon State college, at two meetings to be held in Washington county. The demonstrations are scheduled to be in the county court room here March 20 and Tualatin Grange hall March 21. Both meetings will start at 7:30 p. m.

Clarke will explain the basic principles involved in landscaping. The arrangement of the area around the farmstead for convenience and beauty, and foundation planting will be included in the discussion.

Slug Damage Noted in County

Slug damage on new seedlings of the and ladino clover has been noted in few areas of the county during the past week, reports Palmer S. Torvund, county agent. Since slugs where they are numerous, can materially reduce the stands of young seedling plants, check baiting of the various fields is recommended, usually during cloudy weather, as a means of determining whether or not they are present.

Twenty-four hours will be long enough for the check bait to be out in order to determine whether or not slugs are present. Metaldehyde-arsenate bait is recommended. Either pellet or gran type may be used.

Lindow Cow Makes High Production

BRATTLEBORO, Vt. — A registered Holstein-Friesian cow in the dairy herd owned by Lindow Brothers, route 3, Portland (Bethany), has recently completed a 316-day production record in herd test of 645 pounds of butterfat and 13,110 pounds of milk, the Holstein-Friesian Association of America announces. This is more than three and a half times the production of the average dairy cow in this nation.

Her official name is Lone Fir Johanna Variety 2205953. She was milked three times daily and was four years and 11 months old when she began her record. Her sire is Lone Fir Sir Johanna Tony 4th 710166.

Testing was supervised by Oregon State University in cooperation with the Holstein-Friesian Association of America.
