### High Costs Eyed In Farm Outlook Analyzed by OSC

Both farm prices and farm costs have advanced sharply in the past year, it is shown in the annual outlook analysis for spring planting and pre-planting costs just issued by the agricultural extension service at O.S.C. The outlook report contains sections on grain and hay crops, potatoes and truck crops, storage crop seeds, tree fruits and nuts and some other specialty crops.

Although some farm products declined in price, others advanced to bring the general level up 24 per cent during the year, reaching 246 per cent of the 1935-1939 level in January. During the same period the general level of farm costs in Oregon rose 11 per cent. Farm wage rates in the state were 354 per cent of the 1935-1939 average, while the United States average of other farm costs stood at 198 per cent of the prewar level. By giving labor a weight of 25 per cent it appears that the general level of all Oregon farm costs is about 215 per cent of 1935-1939. This is significant in view of the outlook for lower farm prices during the 1947-48 marketing season. By adjusting farm operations some farmers may hold net farm income up in 1947-48, but on the whole it is probable that net farm income for 1947 production will not be as great as from farm marketing during the 1946-47 season. The report states the volume of production is expected to continue large, but demand, both domestic and foreign is expected to weaken somewhat. The report contains several tables and charts of basic data, including figures showing the relationship between the national disposable income and the farm value of goods. Another table shows the 1946 level of production of various products in percentages of 1935-1939 output. A copy is available free from any county agent or from the college.

### Suggestions on Changing Length Of Hemline Made

Spring style trends indicate that you may need to add an inch or more to a short skirt to bring it up to date, says Betty Scottburn, assistant home demonstration agent.

If a hem crease is conspicuous, try wetting the crease line on the wrong side, then turning the skirt over on the right side and rolling the crease back and forth in the wrong side afterwards.

If a skirt hem must be let out to its full extent, a seam binding or facing material or both are called for. If the dress fabric is heavy, the seam binding may be sewed directly to the skirt edge. Turn the binding up so about one quarter inch of the dress fabric is on the under side of the skirt. If the dress goods is light weight, a facing about an inch wide when finished is needed, to give body to the skirt edge.

Miss Scottburn states that it is possible to lengthen a dress by contrast bands inserted in the skirt adding a yoke to the skirt, letting out waist seams, or setting in a belt of some other material, and covering it with a novelty belt.

### Vets Required To Give Regular Earning Reports

Nearly 4,700 Oregon veterans who are in training under the GI bill will be required to send in four-month earnings reports to assure continued subsistence pay, reports from the Veterans Administration representative for this area, announced.

Under a new rotation plan, the VA will ask wage reports from 700-800 of all trainees each month, completing the cycle every four months. The first fourth with earnings starting with letters from A through G, are receiving new request blank enclosed with each suspension notice.
