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STATE TIMBER SALE

Dead Western Red Cedar Suitable for Posts, Poles and Shingle and Shake Bolts

The Board of Forestry, Salem, Oregon, is offering for sale under sealed bids to be submitted not later than 10 o'clock A. M. March 22, 1947, all of the dead timber on state lands located adjacent to the Wilson River Highway in Townships 1 and 2 North, Ranges 3 and 6 West.

The area is divided into four units, each to be considered as a separate sale and prospective purchasers may bid on one or all units. These are relogging jobs, consisting largely of standing units. There are relogging jobs, suitable for split posts, poles and down dead western red cedar, suitable for split posts, poles and some shingle and shake bolts. A large amount of dead yellow fir suitable for fuel wood may be removed. There is a limited amount of mill logs on the area.

Before submitting bids, prospective purchasers must secure a copy of the prospectus and bid form, as well as a map of the area, from the State Forester.
