**Red Cross Nursing Service is Vital To Good Health**

The Red Cross nursing service is a vital factor in maintaining the nation's health at a high level. Miss Corinne Pennington, nursing activities chairman of Washington county chapter, stated recently in urging public support of the 1947 fund campaign which seeks \$50,000.00 to carry on the Red Cross program. Elizabeth Panick is home nursing chairman.

"There is sickness in one out of ten families in the ordinary run of events," said the chairman, "and 85 per cent of those ill are cared for in the home by some member of the family. To give the home nurse the training necessary to carry on her duties efficiently, the Red Cross provides courses in home nursing which are open to anyone who wishes to enroll."

"In working toward our goal—a home nurse in every home," Miss Pennington said, "the Red Cross last year issued 1941-42 a total of 631 home nursing certificates. In Washington county chapter, two registered nurses gave instruction to 16 classes in making up the course. A total of 631 home nursing certificates have been issued in Washington county. At the present time, one class is in making up the course. A high school, another in the Pacific university for veterans' wives, and a neighborhood group at Laurelwood."

Miss Pennington pointed out that the Red Cross provides public health nursing services in community centers, day care centers, and other service agencies. An additional nursing service is that of recruiting nurses for emergencies. During the past few years, 2000 nurses were recruited from all parts of the country for communities struck by pestilence. "Red Cross nurses are on call at all times to serve when disaster strikes," she said.

In addition to nursing and other health and safety services, Red Cross will continue welfare and recreation services to overseas and domestic troops, servicemen in hospitals and an increasing number of veterans and their families.
