Veterans of Foreign Wars and their Auxiliary will meet Friday night at the V. F. W. hall, Ninth and Oak, at 8 o'clock.



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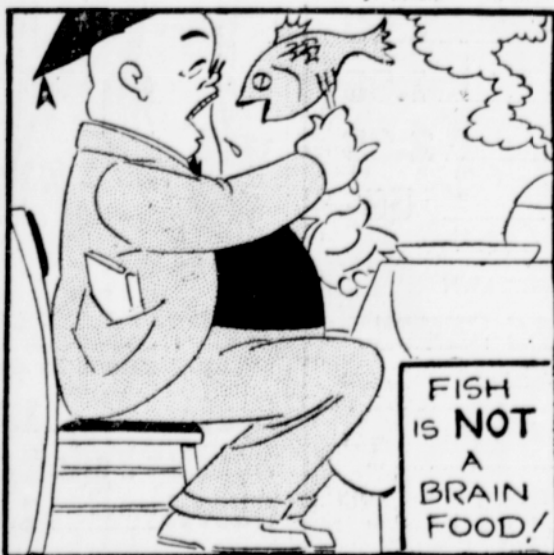
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Larry Jansen Hit By Batted Ball

Truman Urges Aid Be Given Turkey, Greece

President Truman Wednesday asked congress in joint session to supply \$400 million and American military advisers to Greece and Turkey—Mediterranean bulwarks against Communism. Mr. Truman told the legislators that "the foreign policy and the national security of this country are involved." He said the "gravity of the situation" had brought him before the joint session.

Difficulties Ahead

Secretary of State George C. Marshall Sunday told the Russian people great difficulties confronted the four-power foreign ministers at their conference in Moscow on the future of Germany and Austria but that he was confident of agreement.

China Action Blocked

Secretary of State Marshall won his first diplomatic triumph in the foreign ministers' council Tuesday when the United States, Britain and France put up a solid front and blocked a Russian proposal to place the complex China question on the agenda.

Contempt Guilt Affirmed—The supreme court in a history 7-2 decision adjudged John L. Lewis and the United Mine Workers guilty of contempt and branded their actions a "serious threat" to constitutional government and the nation's welfare.

Unperturbed by his supreme court defeat, John L. Lewis, as a witness before the senate labor committee Friday blasted the government for "black-bucking" his coal miners with antislavery injunctions, offered to negotiate a new contract at any time, and opposed any and all changes in existing labor laws.

Labor Curb Asked—Senator Wayne Morse Monday proposed that congress restrict the national labor relations board to seek federal court injunctions to restrain an enlarged field of activities he would define as unfair labor practices. He asked that congress make it unfair labor practice for unions to call jurisdictional strikes, engage in secondary boycotts, coerce an employer in the selection of his bargaining agent or violate the terms of a collective bargaining contract.

Case Strike Ends—The 14-month-old J. I. Case company strike, second oldest major walkout in the nation, ended Sunday when members of UAW Local 180 voted 927 to 448 to return to their jobs at the farm equipment plant.

Foremen May Organize—The supreme court Monday granted foremen the right to organize their own unions under Wagner act protection.

OPA Voted Out—The house voted Tuesday to kill the OPA effective June 30. Secretary of Labor Schwelb and Chairman Hartley of the house labor committee agreed Tuesday the Communists party in America should be outlawed. Hartley told reporters he would introduce a bill to do so.

Appointment Approved—Senate atomic committee Monday approved by 8-1 appointment of David E. Lilienthal as chairman of the atomic energy commission.

Reciprocal Pacts Aim—President Truman at Waco, Texas, told the world Thursday that reciprocal trade is the only avenue to lasting peace and that the United States must take the lead in shaping global economic agreements.

U. S. Ship Seized—Sixty Dutch marines, sailors and civil police boarded the American Liberty ship Martin Behrman and overpowered the first mate as he attempted to raid the gangplank in carrying out the orders of his captain to frustrate the Dutch authorities. The ship had been loaded in republican Java, contrary to Dutch regulations.

Americans Arrested—Eighteen American crewmen of the former U. S. naval vessel PY31, on which 390 Jewish refugees were intercepted, were arrested Sunday on charges of "aiding and abetting illegal immigration" in Malabar county, Oregon.

Murder Confessed—Alvin Lee Williams, 24-year-old Pima, Idaho, confessed Monday to the shotgun murder of De W. D. Broadhurst, Cal'well, Idaho, rancher. The confession came as he testified at the widow's own murder conspiracy trial in Malabar county, Oregon.

Two Women Found Murdered—Nearly nude bodies of two women, both victims of violent deaths, were found in Los Angeles Tuesday, bringing to four the number of unsolved feminine slayings in Los Angeles since January 15.

Students Quit—School was out Tuesday at Warrenton as high school students refused to attend classes because the school board failed to re-elect James E. Hatch, principal and coach.

Famed Woman Dies—Mrs. Carrie Chapman Catt, 88, internationally famous pioneer suffragist and peace advocate, died of a heart attack Sunday in her New Rochelle, N. Y., home.

Sales Tax Bill To Be Presented

The Oregon house of representatives voted Tuesday to introduce a three per cent retail sales tax bill expected to raise \$24,000,000, while the legislature turned to new financial problems growing out of a supreme court decision that counties can budget as little as they want for public welfare.

The sales tax measure introduced after weeks of study and revision by a subcommittee and the house tax committee would give half of its funds equally to counties, cities and school districts for use as a property tax offset. The other half would go to the state general fund and could be used to offset the state property tax when income tax money is not enough to do so.

The measure, which exempts food sold in grocery stores but not in restaurants, would be referred to the people at a special election on November 18, 1947.

A companion measure approved for introduction would raise income tax personal exemptions from \$750 to \$1570 for a single person and from \$1500 to \$2500 for a married person.

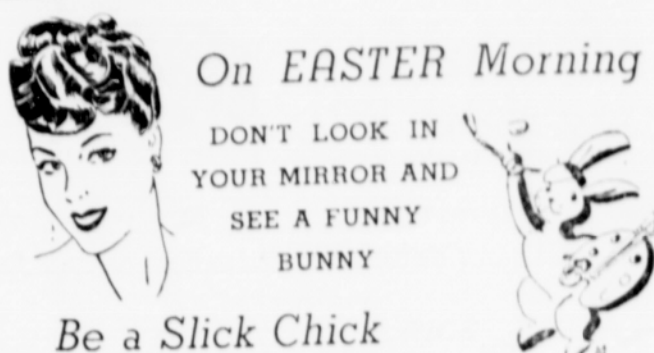
