

## 4-H Group Plans Tree Planting Fair Grounds

A tree-planting day will be featured Saturday, April 19, at the new county fair grounds by 75 4-H forestry club members. The event will be an all-day affair beginning at 10 a. m., according to Joe Cox, assistant county agent.

Club members will plant 85 Norway maple trees on the new fair grounds. The trees were presented to the fair board by a prominent Portland nurseryman, and gave the forestry club members an opportunity to do the planting.

This is the first step in the beautification of the new fairgrounds. The trees will be planted in a border around the area with a view toward permanently beautifying the site.

Club members should bring lunches with them as it will be an all-day affair. All county 4-H club members are invited to come and join in the project.

Farmers hold out on marketing if prices tend to be low. He said "now the honeymoon is over."

Jerome said three things should be done to help the frozen food industry: 1—To curtail production capacity. 2—Concentrate on fancy pack. 3—Advertise frozen foods.

The small plant will have to specialize and put out good quality to stay in business, he reported. The banker said the 1946 pack has not moved out as expected on some lines and pointed out that "during the war they (packers) borrowed up to 80 per cent of the value of their pack but definitely cannot now."

Fulton Lewis Jr., national radio commentator, speaking on "The Washington Outlook," said in reference to recent strike legislation that the employers now will have the same rights as unions. He predicted much less strike trouble for the country as a result.

Dr. Ernest Wiegand of Oregon State college, Corvallis, an instructor on foods, said that the frozen food industry, although a baby of the food industry, has all the earmarks of a rapidly expanding industry. He said it is still going through the experimental stage but is entering a period of development that will stimulate future business competition. Quality will be the keynote, he said.

Dr. Wiegand said it takes much experimental work to secure a good frozen berry. It is hard to find a fruit with the four main points—taste, color, general eye appeal, preservation qualities—he said, pointing out that the ideal berry is still to be developed. The speaker said the frozen food industry should set up uniform standards. Oregon State college is making a study on this.

The pre-war consumption of frozen fruit was four-fifths of a pound per person and is now 2.5 pounds, it was revealed. It was pointed out that nation-wide publicity could increase this appreciably. F. J. Becker of the Gresham co-operative was elected chairman.

Funeral services for Mrs. Wickstrand will be held Thursday (today) at 1 p. m. at J. P. Finley's Morninglight chapel in Portland with interment at Lincoln Memorial park. She is survived by her husband, Arthur T. Wickstrand; two daughters, Gail Patricia Wickstrand and little Janice Mildred Wickstrand; father and mother, Mr. and Mrs. J. T. Krause, and two brothers, Dexter and Paul Krause.
