Opening Attracts

Visitors from all parts of the county and from outside were present at the grand opening of the B and T Market and Food Bank in West Slope Saturday. Four food demonstrations as well as a broadcast by Rolfe Truitt and his gang kept the crowd interested between tours of inspection of the modern plant. Of primary interest were the 2250 individual lockers, comprising 60,000 cubic feet of freezing space, the lockers ranging from six to 12 cubic feet. A chill room, with ultra violet ray lamps for eliminating mold, and a quick freezing unit, meats and other products is included in the locker setup. The meat department is under the handling of Miles A. Taylor and Jerry Gardner. Ed Hilde is in charge of the grocery department and the Danish pastry shop in the building is operated by Mr. and Mrs. C. D. Joslin.

ment is being installed to provide greater efficiency in law enforcement, fire protection and in the water department. It is expected that other governmental departments will later co-operate in this program. Similar installations have been made at Tillamook, McMinnville and Oregon City.

An increase of \$1000 for betterments under the park fund was voted by the committee so that improvements can be made in recreational facilities in line with the enlarged program being undertaken here. The desirability of improving the park property, especially as the Bagley lot, on North Second avenue for recreational purposes was discussed. Total of the park fund was set at \$5,000 divided as follows: salaries and wages, \$2,250; material and supplies, \$300; water, light and sewer, \$100; and betterments, \$2,350.

Police department estimates were upped from \$12,060 last year to \$13,430 with two officers designated for traffic. The department now includes five full time officers.

Fire department expenditures were placed at \$11,040 as contrasted with \$9,900 for 1936-37. Airport budget was set at \$19,500. Library expenditures are advanced from \$3,000 to \$3,500.

More Lights Planned
Street light was advanced from \$4,500 to \$4,800 and Manager J. W. Barney said it was hoped to work out arrangements for an increase in lighting throughout the residential area. The city is also making investigations of improved street lighting in the business area and on the highway, it was revealed.

Parking meter installation, maintenance and rentals are estimated at \$7,050 to be offset from revenues estimated at \$12,000. Such income can only be used for traffic control and the remainder will go to help pay the salaries of officers engaged in traffic work.

Other estimated receipts in the general fund include cash on hand \$17,742.69; taxes, levies from other years, \$2,000; occupation taxes, etc., \$2,800; utility franchise fees, Portland General Electric \$3,200, Portland Gas & Coke company \$100, total \$3,300; permits, \$1,000; fines and forfeitures, \$5,000; dog redemptions, \$50; rural fire services, \$2,750; liquor revenue, \$2,500; bicycle licenses, \$100; city park-auditorium \$2,000. Fourth of July celebration, \$1,000; airport, \$5,375—rentals \$4,000, income from gasoline \$700, crop rentals, \$675; miscellaneous, \$250 total.

Improvements Planned
Street fund expenditures are estimated at \$23,500, which will match receipts of \$15,000 from the state gas tax fund, road fund \$7,500 and miscellaneous \$1,000. Expenditures under this are: city engineer, \$2,000; street cleaning, \$2,350; traffic, \$250; street maintenance, \$9,800; resurfacing of existing streets, oiling and county road connections, \$8,000; and miscellaneous, \$1,100. Street improvements under this include N. Fifth avenue extension, grading and surfacing, \$1,500; S. Tenth between Main and Baseline, \$3,200; and widening S. First avenue \$3,300.

Members of the budget committee included E. J. McAlear, chairman; J. L. Searcy, secretary; Arthur Reiling, W. H. Weber, Robert Busch and Nye Bristol.

The details of the budget will be published under public notices next week.

Request Order Off For APO Parcels

War department order requiring a written request to send parcels to APOs, and limitations of one parcel a week to the same APO addresses were lifted at the end of April, according to Postmaster L. McPherson.

Post offices will now accept without the written request parcels not exceeding 70 pounds in weight and 100 inches in length and girth combined which are addressed to persons authorized to receive mail at overseas APOs and for their personal use. No change is being made in the eight-ounce weight limit applicable to air mail to overseas APOs in care of postmasters in New York and San Francisco.

The National Iris Gardens at Beaverton, owned by Mrs. Edna C. Weed, has attracted visitors from all parts of the United States and the correspondence varies from European nobility to distinguished people in the states as well as the farmer who wishes to enhance his home garden.

The late Howard Everts Weed attended Michigan Agricultural college where he majored in biology. Following graduation with a B. S. degree in 1929 and M. S. degree the next year he later spent nine years with Mississippi Agricultural college conducting the early entomological work of his experiment station.

Mr. Weed authored the book "Modern Park Cemeteries," which he wrote following additional studies at Cornell university and the subsequent opening of his office of landscape and gardening. He is also credited with the publication "Spraying for Profit."

Mr. Weed named some 30 varieties, outstanding among which are: Icy Blue, Michelangelo, Noontide Sky, Oregon Sunshine, Claret Velvet, National Giant and National White. He established the Weed's Landscape Nursery east of Beaverton in 1910 when he moved to Oregon. The name of the firm was changed in 1933 to the National Iris Gardens.

Howard Weed passed much of his knowledge and handicraft with iris to his wife, Edna C. Weed, who continues in ownership and sole management. Mrs. Weed has extended an invitation to the public to see the gardens at any time, especially now when the iris are in full bloom.

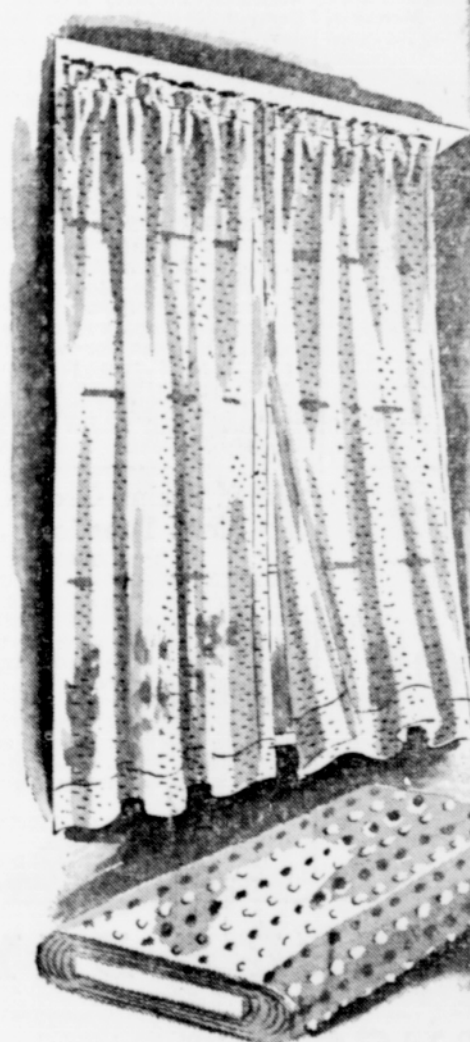

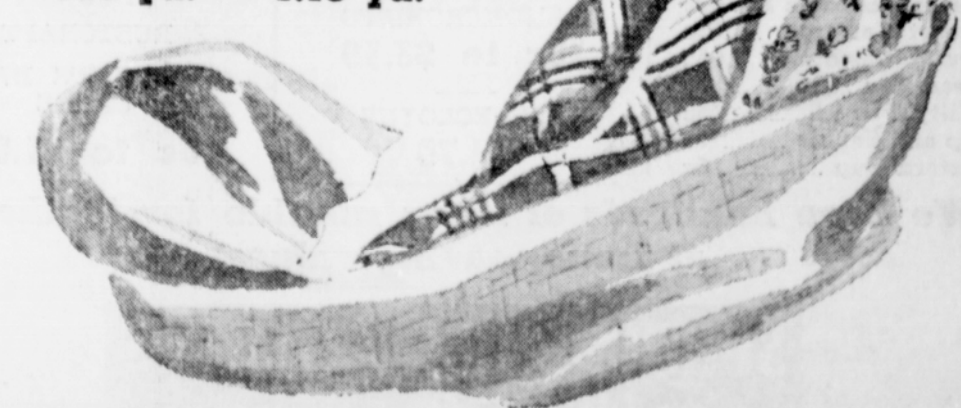
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
