

Homemakers Festival Here Successful Event

The first Homemakers' Festival of Washington county was held Thursday, April 24, at the Grange Hall, Hillsboro. It was attended by 250 county men and women.

The meeting was opened by Mrs. L. W. Kingsley, route 2, Beaverton, chairman of the county committee extension unit. Mrs. Arlene Sager, state home demonstration agent, gave an interesting talk on "Adventures Around the World," displaying articles obtained on her trip.

Palmer Tolsted, county agent for Washington county, spoke on the extension program in Washington county, explaining how home demonstration agents and county agents work together, and ways the program will continue to grow.

Dr. Edith J. Freeman talked on "The Happy Family," citing examples from her experiences while working with farm families on family relationship problems.

Interesting exhibits were made by most extension units of Washington county showing what has been accomplished in recent years. The exhibits included "Meals from the Pantry Shelf" by Tualatin unit; "Professional Touches in Sewing" by Johnson unit; "Good Taste in Clothing" by Cedar Mill unit; "New Textiles" by Shady Brook unit; "Homemade Toys" by Harrison unit; "Good Taste at the Dining Table" by Forest Grove unit; "Repairing Inexpensive Cushions" by Hillsdale unit; "Growing Old Gracefully" by Watts unit; "Renovated Davenport" by Brockwood unit; "Pressing" by Cherry Grove unit; "Food Preservation" by the county committee; "Handicraft" by North Plains and Cherry Grove units; "Flower Arrangements" by North Plains unit and a school room skit presented by Glenwood unit.

The Associated Country Women of the World had articles donated from all parts of the world. The 4-H exhibits included dresses made by 4-H clubs in the county.

Special dances were given by the 4-H girls in Beaverton including Vanda Benson, Anita Plonovi and Patricia Seidler, accompanied by Arlene Amell.

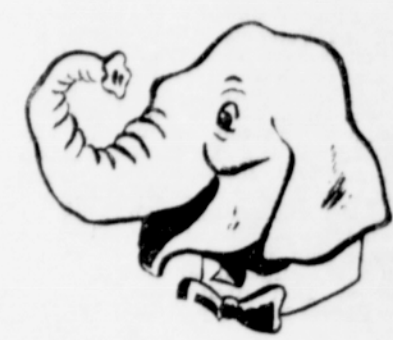
Slip Cover Class To be Organized
