

Strawberry Picking Platoons of Boys and Girls Being Recruited

Recruiting of girls and boys to work in strawberry picking platoons is now underway by school superintendents and principals in various parts of the county, according to Roy L. Davidson, farm labor assistant. No platoons are planned in the Forest Grove area; there are many smaller growers in this section who are best served by workers not organized into groups.

Platoons, first organized in Washington county shortly after Pearl Harbor, consist of a paid supervisor and 20 to 40 workers, mostly youth of school age, although adults also work in these groups. Platoons have greatly increased in popularity with parents and growers since their inception. They provide growers with trained and supervised labor, and parents are pleased to have their children profitably employed under good supervision. Platoons are chosen through the farm labor office and are usually teachers or others who are qualified by experience and training for youth leadership. All platoons are transported by school buses.

Platoons work an average of six hours in the field. This shorter day enables the children to work without becoming over-tired and mothers have ample time at home to keep their work up.

School teachers throughout the county are again aiding the farm labor office by signing up all pupils in their schools who are old enough to pick berries.

First ripe strawberries were picked Tuesday morning on David Hill near Forest Grove. Many fields are expected to be in operation by May 13.

County Jail Down To Five Tenants Saturday Morning

Things have been quiet around the Washington county jail of late, number of tenants getting down to only five on Saturday morning, lower than on any day for some time, according to Jailer Joe Mullins. Two of the five were women.

The county jail had 37 men and women listed during April and they were given a total of 630 meals. This was an appreciable drop from March when 61 persons were listed for a total of 1,064 meals. Mullins said the jail gave 338 meals in January and 642 in February. A total of 36 men and women were on the county jail books for January and 37 for April.

For three consecutive days, starting on February 27 the county jail had no visitors, first time it has been unoccupied for a long period of years, according to Mullins. That three-day spell was broken on March when Albert Jack Green, 16-year-old Lake Grove boy, was jailed on a murder charge. Mullins attests to the boy's mental ability, saying he handled classical pieces with finesse. People gathered outside the jail on several evenings to listen, unknown to Green.

The jailer said blankets, sheets and pillow cases are changed completely at least once a week in the jail and it is completely fumigated once a week, keeping it devoid of bugs.

New Air Mail Letter Started

A new 10-cent air mail type of letter was inaugurated April 29 by the post office department in Washington, D. C., according to L. McPheeters, Hillsboro postmaster.

The new type air mail letter form resembles the war-time A-1 mail only that it will not be photographed. It is a letter-envelope stamped form and is meant for international mails to foreign countries where it costs far more than the new 10-cent charge.

McPheeters stated that also like the V-mail, the letters should not contain enclosures. This new air mail letter may be obtained from any post office.
