Born to Mr. and Mrs. M. C. Benton, a boy, Saturday in Jones hospital in Hillsboro. This is their third son.

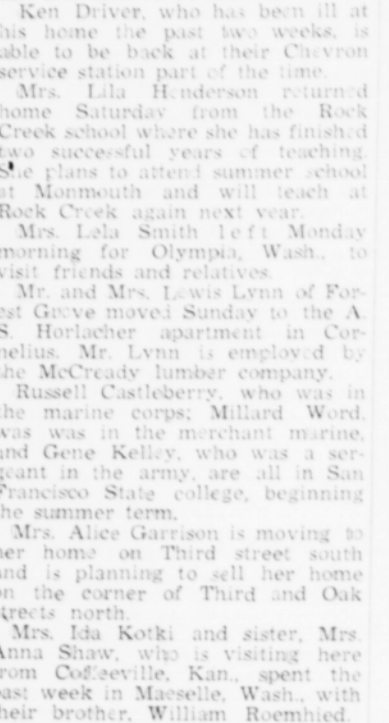

Examination of Children Before School Suggested

This is the time of year when all children who are to enter school for the first time in September, either kindergarten or first grade, should have a physical examination and complete their immunizations.

Many parents have responded to our earlier notices. Dr. H. M. Skolte, medical director of our county health department, urges those who have not done so already to attend to this important procedure early in the summer.

This health examination may be done by the family physician in his office and the completed report sent to the health department for recording in whatever district the child will enter school. All physicians in the county have uniform blanks for recording pertinent findings.

It is the parents' responsibility to see that the completed health examination blank is filed in the health department office before the opening of school.

If anyone wishes to come to the health department for this times used to help neutralize the gastric acidity, but just as important as diet and drugs is the patient's need for physical and emotional rest.

The most difficult part of ulcer therapy is the prevention of recurrences. Doctors hope for the discovery of an effective medical method. 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Forest Conservation Importance Cited

valley which makes use of waste wood.

The state forester traced the history of utilizing timber in this area for commercial purposes. He said the first use was probably in 1787 when it was used for building a sloop. First lumber shipped down the Columbia river was in 1828.

James Young built one of the first saw mills in this area in 1837 at Newburg.

By 1880 most of the mills of the area were using circular saws and this date saw about the last of water power for mills. By 1940 the lumber production in Oregon aggregated about 192 billion board feet of lumber. During the next five years the cut was nearly 33 billion board feet.

Rogers pointed out that we lost about 250,000 men during the war, but the depletion in materials and natural resources is almost uncountable. As an example, he said that of the known sources of oil the supply will last only an estimated 11 or 12 years.

Cut in Oregon last year was 7,130,000 board feet of lumber, enough for a five room house for every three people in the state. This represents more than 20 per cent of the nation's production for last year.

The state forester pointed out that Oregon still had about 380 billion board feet of lumber left in its forests for production. This represents more than twice what has been cut in the past for commercial use, he said, but stressed the need for protecting what we have.

Health for All: Peptic Ulcers

From five to 12 per cent of the U. S. population suffers from peptic ulcers sometime during their lives. In our strenuous times ulcer ranks 10th among chronic diseases as a cause of death and 12th as a cause of days lost from work. The term peptic ulcer describes ulcers of the stomach and of the upper part of the intestinal tract.

Of the many theories as to the cause of peptic ulcers, the most generally accepted is that they are caused by a gastric acidity which erodes the lining of the stomach or the lining of the small intestine. People who worry a lot or who work under tension are more apt to get ulcers than others. Contrary to popular belief, drinking and smoking do not cause ulcers. However, if a person has or has had an ulcer, alcohol, excessive

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First U. S. Citizen Born on Kwajalein
