

Educational Aids Benefits Cited By State Head

Oregon World War II veterans seeking state educational aid benefits will be restricted to \$35 a month for each month in service, with payments limited to 36 months. George E. Sandy, state director of veterans' affairs, said today in outlining the recent legislative amendments to the act. The veteran also must have served at least six months in the armed forces.

Previously, three months in service entitled any Oregon veteran to \$35 a month for the entire 36 months.

Also, time spent in the army republishing training program (A3-T3) or the navy V-12 program, will no longer count as service in the army forces under terms of the new act, after June 30.

However, the law has been liberalized in these respects, it was explained:

1. Forty hours of school attendance per month instead of the previous 60 hours entitle the veteran to the \$35 payment.

2. The veteran may now attend an approved vocational school to be eligible. Sandy said he anticipates many veterans taking advantage of the benefits to attend the new state vocational school at Klamath Falls, due to open in July.

3. Payments to the veteran will be expedited up, by eliminating certain cumbersome reports previously required from the schools.

Silver Polish Said Good for Saucepan

Silver polish seems to be the best material for keeping the outside of an aluminum pressure saucepan bright. Demonstration of the inside is common. Although these stains are harmless, the orderly housekeepers may wish to keep the natural color of the metal. Manufacturers recommend the following procedure:

For each quart of water use one table-spoon of cream of tartar. Pour enough of the solution into the saucepan to cover the two line of discoloration, but not over 2/3 full. Then place the cover on the cooker. Heat until a steady flow of steam emerges from the vent pipe before setting the indicator-weight in place. Continue heating until the indicator reaches the cooking position, then remove the cooker from the stove. Allow the cooker to stand for two or three hours without removing the indicator-weight.

After opening the cooker, scour thoroughly with steel wool pads made for cleaning aluminum. Wash and rinse thoroughly.

Boiling acid foods such as tomatoes and rhubarb without pressure, in an aluminum pan helps to clean it. This food is still wholesome as the aluminum compounds are harmless.
