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Person Named To Pacific U. Trustee Board

J. M. Person of Hillsboro was last week elected to the Pacific university board of trustees to serve until 1953. He was also appointed chairman of the finance committee. Three other county men are on the board of trustees, W. C. Christensen of Hillsboro and J. R. McCready and Louis P. Busch of Forest Grove.

It was revealed at a meeting of the board, May 28, that enrollment of the Forest Grove school has hit a record high of 1,029 counting special music and summer session students. Highest previous enrollment was 350.

The William Morgan Kent Memorial Scholarship fund was created with money received from the estate of William Kent of Hillsboro. This amounted to \$3,434.88 for scholarship purposes. Largest gift during the year to the school was \$10,000 from Dr. and Mrs. Franklin Warner of California. Second largest was from the late Franklin Warren and his sister, Mrs. Walter A. Holt of Portland, for \$7,500 in memory of their nephew, William R. Warren, who died in navy service.

Optometrists of the northwest and California secured \$15,000 for the Optometry college. It was revealed in the report of President W. C. Giersbach. The federal government has contributed two structures from Camp Adair which represent an investment of about \$220,000. The building program report included mention of the 56-bed addition to McCormick hall for next year.

Veterans drawing compensation for service-connected disabilities, who wish to enter a job training program should be informed that under Public Law 16, any injuries incurred during the training program which result in further disability or death will receive benefits on the same basis as if the disability or death had been incurred in war service, according to Dolph Stuart, county service officer.

Alter Gets High Government Post At Seoul, Korea

Melvin L. Alter, son of Mr. and Mrs. Leslie Alter of Hillsboro, has been appointed vice-chairman and executive secretary for the National Economic board, Seoul, Korea. Announcement was made by Major General Archer L. Lerch, military governor of Korea.

Alter for the past eight months has been engaged in the reorganization of the Korean government, development of an organizational structure to establish a nucleus for the future government of Korea. This plan, worked out in conjunction with leading Korean officials, was recently accepted by the military governor and the Korean legislature and was presented by Alter to the American-Soviet joint commission now meeting in Seoul.

The National Economic board is the top policy and planning agency in the military government, and Alter's appointment is a signal honor for him. Prior to going to Korea, he was in Europe with the economic section of the department of state and in his new position will work closely with the state department mission to Korea.

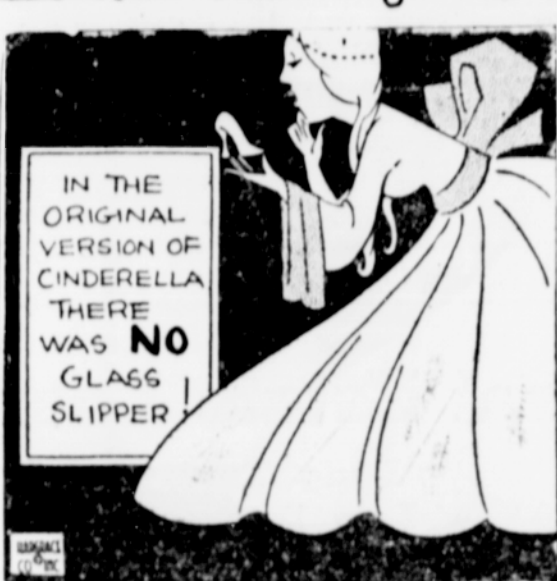
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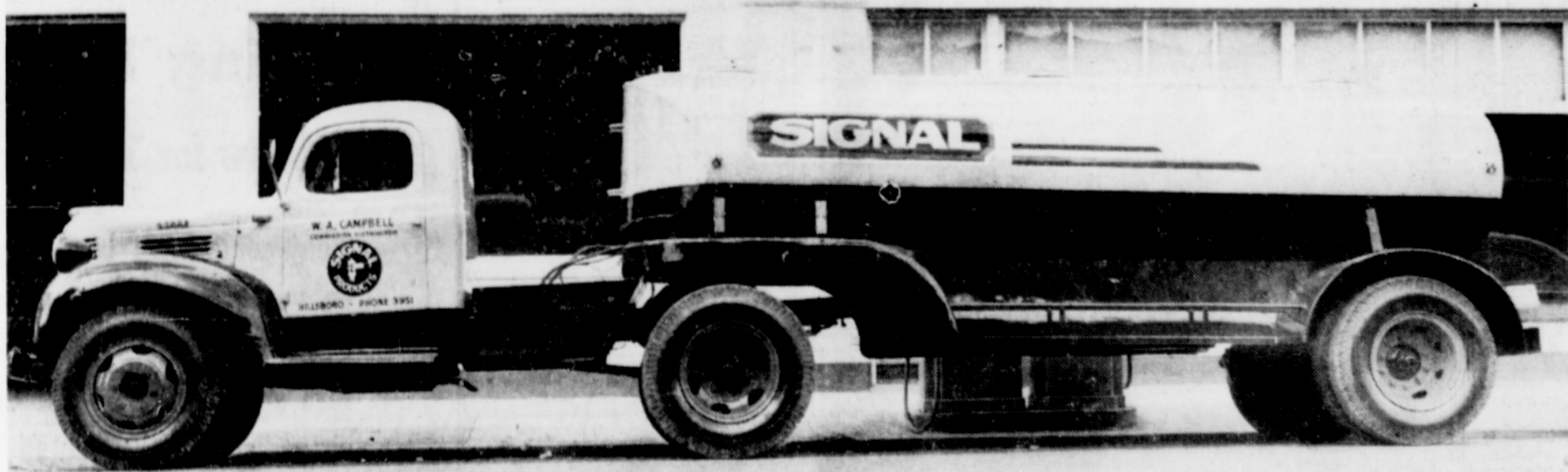
