

Hospital Wing Now Being Used

New U-shaped wing of the Jones hospital at the corner of Baseline and Seventh in Hillsboro, now in part use, will have a 100-bed capacity and will be devoted to medical and surgical work when completed, it was announced this week by Mr. and Mrs. Sam Coy, owners and managers. It is also contemplated utilizing the present main building for maternity cases which already has 18 baby cribs.

At present 60 beds have been set up and two new surgeries have been built; the two used in the present hospital being allocated for delivery rooms, said Mrs. Coy. Of the 60 personnel who work at the hospital 12 are doctors, 27 registered nurses, a full-time anesthetist, and x-ray laboratory technician with two assistants. Included in the new equipment are two oxygen tents, two incubators, two sterilizing units, complete unit for freezing, two small incubators, two x-ray units, electrocardiograph, McKesson Metabolizer, and other things yet unpacked.

Weekly conferences are held each Thursday morning by the staff of doctors at a breakfast round-table at the Cove. The Jones hospital is registered with the American Hospital association, Oregon state hospital association, and the Association of West Coast hospitals. Mr. and Mrs. Coy returned last week from a medical convention in Seattle.
