The L. F. Eicken and W. F. Gemella families attended a family picnic at Washington park Sunday. Picnic picking began at the L. F. Eicken field Monday.

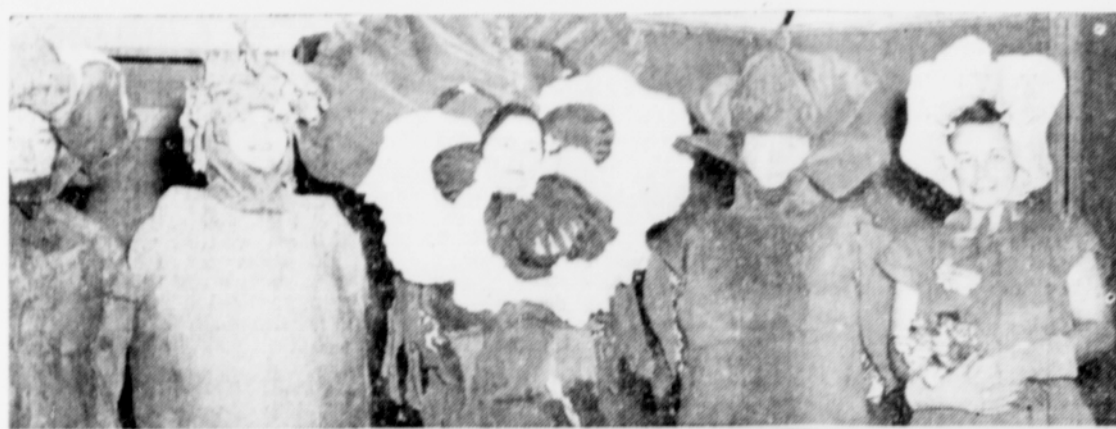
George Jack was honor guest at Father's Day dinner at the M. R. Jack home Sunday. Nine were present.

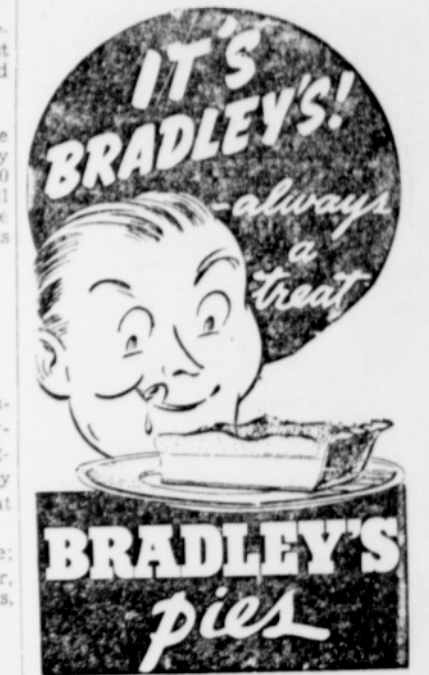

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It was found that 77 of the 78, or 98 percent, were alive and living active, useful lives.

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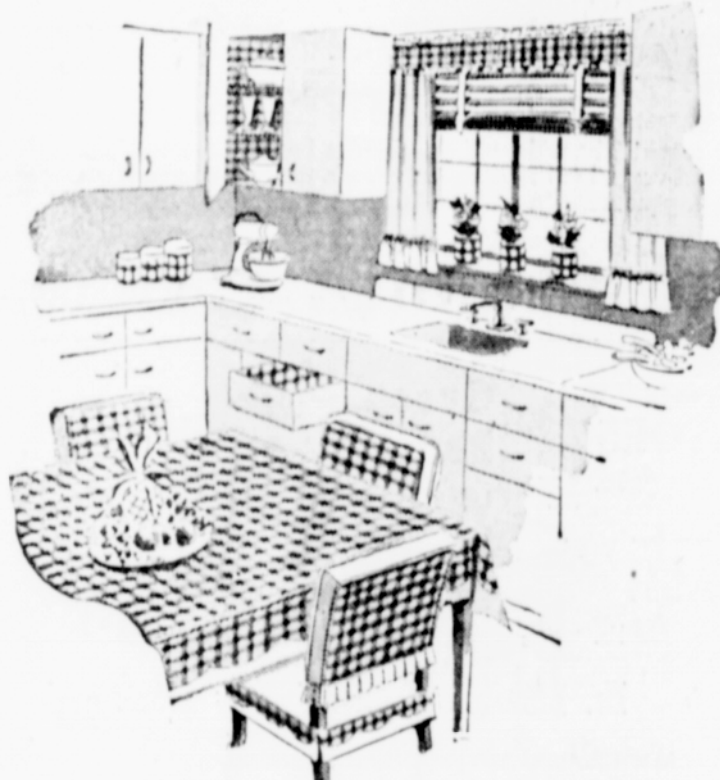
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
