Regulation for Trucks Slated; Report Delayed

An ordinance regulating the parking of commercial vehicles on a yearly basis was ordered drawn by the city council Tuesday night. The ordinance, which will be considered at the next meeting, is similar to one in operation in Oregon City.

Time for filing the engineer's report on the extension of North

Fourth from Main to Jackson, East Grant from Fifth to Birchwood Drive, and Sixth from Jackson to Edison was extended to August 5.

A resolution of intention to improve East Edison from Fifth to Birchwood park with curbs and a 20-foot macadam roadway was approved. Favorable action was taken on resolutions of appointment of improvement coats on East Jackson from Fifth to Sixth, North Sixth from Main to Jackson, and East Jackson from Sixth to Cornell road.

An ordinance providing for the vacation of a portion of an alley, running north and south in the block bounded by Fifth, Jackson,

Sixth and Lincoln, as petitioned by Alfred L. and Helen E. Amachi, was ordered drawn. Thomas H. Tongue Jr. represented the petitioners and Henry Nelson and Mrs. Walter Henry spoke in behalf of protesting property owners.

Petition of Hoyer Electric company to install a 550-gallon gasoline storage tank at its place of business on South Fourth avenue was referred to the fire committee and Manager J. W. Barney to report at the August meeting.

Barney reported that according to word received by him that the traffic control lights on the highway would probably be installed by the commission in August.

Mayor E. A. Griffith and Recorder Edwin Bowman were authorized to sign a right-of-way agreement with the Southern Pacific for a crossing at the farm labor camp near Shute park. They were also authorized to make application to the county court for easement for a drain line north on Fifth avenue from the city limits.

ministrator for the newly-created board is to receive \$1,200, and \$1,000 was provided for clerical salaries. Salary raises and increased costs for supplies brought the budget for the county clerk's office up from \$20,785 to \$23,390. A \$2,615 addition to the funds for the health unit district was caused mainly by salary raises for the sanitarian and nurses.

Another increase forced by state legislation is in the justice courts department of the county budget, raised from \$1,220 last year to \$15,570 this year. The 1947-48 budget adds \$14,400 in salaries for justices and \$900 in salaries for constables. Addition of an assistant county agent on the rolls raised the levy by \$2,000. The assistant agent was added to meet the demand for more services.

Delinquent Taxes Listed
Delinquent tax collections are estimated at \$13,248.12, and interest on delinquent taxes are given as \$8,187.24, for a total of \$21,435.36 from the county tax department. Anticipated receipts from county offices other than the tax department are given as \$126,939.04, for a total of \$148,374.40 anticipated receipts, county general fund.

Total anticipated expenditures out of the county general fund are \$129,734. The estimated amount of 1947-48 taxes that will not be collected before June 30, 1948, is \$11,105.23. The proposed general fund levy for the 1947-48 year is \$343.44.

The county school fund tax levy shows an increase from \$125,704.60 on the 1946-47 budget to the present total of \$130,431.40. All but \$1,291.40 of this figure represents a levy of \$10 per census child for 12,114 children. A levy of 10 cents per child is listed for the county school library.

Road Fund Drops
The county general road fund tax levy shows a drop from \$119,012.36 to \$79,492.82.

Other departmental budget decreases include the tax department and district attorney. Two of the four clerks in the tax department were eliminated, enabling a cut

The new and improved airplane ride, being featured here for the first time, will take riders up about 20 feet off the ground in what has proven to be the most thrilling ride at Shute park.

Position Given On Labor Law

NEW YORK—In the wake of the passage of the Taft-Hartley act over the President's veto, General Foods issued its 15,000 employees that the law would bring no change in the company's industrial relation policies.

In a statement posted on bulletin boards in all 69 General Foods plants from coast to coast, and in letters to all employees, Clarence Francis, chairman, and Austin S. Iglehart, president, said:

"We want to convey a word of faith and reassurance to all employees of General Foods as to the future of our relations. The principles of human relations for which your management stands are clearly set forth in the booklet entitled 'Employee Relations in General Foods.' They have been in effect since April 1937. There is ample evidence to justify the belief that they are supported by the vast majority of employees and have contributed to harmonious relationships during the past difficult years.

"Our management is committed to the maintenance of those principles and believes there are no inconsistencies between them and any provision of the revised labor law, which we have carefully reviewed."

The Francis-Iglehart statement assured employees that General Foods' management will operate under the provisions of the law in such a way as to maintain the satisfactory relationships which have existed in the past. (General Foods has no major labor problems during 1946.)

The statement referred to the company's annual report sent all employees where company policy was summed up with "we believe in basic human values and are endeavoring to demonstrate these beliefs by the manner in which we administer the affairs of this company. The goals are jobs, freedom, and the greater dignity of the individual."

Cars Given to 159 Oregon Amputees

Government - purchased cars, trucks and tractors have been approved for 159 of Oregon's disabled ex-GIs who lost, or lost the use of, one or both legs at or above the ankle, according to Thomas M. Craig, veterans administration representative in this area. Vehicles have actually been delivered to 129 of these disabled veterans, he added. Deadline under present federal legislation for amputee veterans to apply for free automobiles was last Monday, June 30. Craig meets with veterans each Thursday afternoon in the Hillsboro city hall.
