

Fire Prevention Drive Increased To Cut Losses

James Lewis, Keep Oregon Green chairman for Washington county, has been asked to step up activities of his fire prevention committee for the next ninety days in an effort to save millions of dollars of forest and valuable crop land. The urgent appeal for help came from Dean Paul M. Dunn, state chairman of Keep Oregon Green.

"With proper care," Dean Dunn said, "it will be possible to reduce the annual average of 450 man-caused fires in Oregon during the next 90 days. Most citizens are careful while traveling in the woods, but we always have the small fraction who know all safety rules and unknowingly start fires."

Dean Dunn urged the local chairman to end out frequent warning during the summer in the hopes that some fire destruction can be curbed locally.

"Children of your county deserve special citations," Dean Dunn said, "for the wonderful spirit of enthusiasm they have brought to the Green Guard and Keep Oregon Green. I can only hope that these people may be effective where every other type of appeal has failed to reach the minds of the deliberate destroyers who drop brands along highways and in our dry woods."

Maslens See Relatives In California

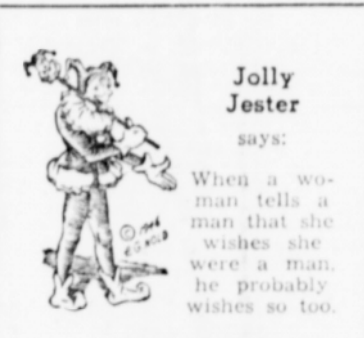
