Humans Rarely Catch Anthrax

Anthrax, an infectious and usually fatal animal disease, is blamed for the death of a cow Friday on the Frank P. Utz farm near Snowwood, is transmitted to humans only rarely, according to Dr. Harold M. Erickson, state health officer.

Only 12 cases of the disease have been reported in humans in the last 15 years, state health department records show. The last case reported in Baker county in 1941. The last known death from anthrax in the state was that of a 22-year-old man in Ontario 10 years ago. The nearest approach to an epidemic was an outbreak of five cases in Kansas in 1923.

The Utz farm herd has been placed under quarantine, and veterinary controls, principally isolation and preventive inoculation, ordinarily prevent spread of the disease. Dr. Erickson said the disease is transmitted from animals to man usually by handling the meat or hides of infected animals.

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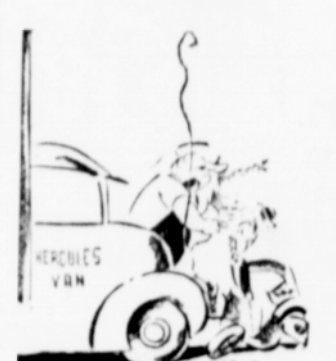
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Home Economics Club of Aloha Grange Meets
