

Grove Baseball Nine Tips Locals By 3-to-2 Margin

Forest Grove's Lions edged Hillsboro by a narrow 3-to-2 score at Westmoreland park in Portland Tuesday evening to eliminate the locals from the 1947 Oregon semi-pro baseball tournament. It was the second heart-breaking loss of the journey for Dr. Francis Dieck, team pitcher for the locals, who was unopposed in Tualatin Valley league play.

None of the runs in Tuesday's game was earned, both infielders producing a flock of errors. An error gave Forest Grove the win-

ning tally in the bottom half of the sixth inning. John Burak got life on first baseman's misstep, stole second, went to third on Pitcher Davis' single and scored on a neat squeeze bunt by Ross Delbondt.

Hillsboro jumped off to a lead in the first of the second by pushing over one run but Forest Grove came back with two in the last half of the same frame. Hillsboro tallied its second run in the first of the sixth.

The Townsies dropped their first game of the journey to Hollywood Santa Shop 2 to 0 July 21. Forest Grove dropped its first tilt to Byers' Stars of Portland, 4 to 2, in the last inning. Banks was first team to suffer double defeat in the state tourney, losing to Rialto Hills, 6 to 2, and to Timber Structures, 4 to 0, in a pair of good games.
