Dr. V. Vojta is dean of the Russian Department at the Northwestern School in Minneapolis. Under his leadership the department has grown marvelously during its existence of four years. It is not only the pulse of the Northwestern school, but it is influential throughout America. The department already has a multitude of friends from all parts of this country as well as Canada.

Dr. Vojta was born in Russia and received his early academic and religious training there. Later he studied in Warsaw, Poland, then in Canada and the United States. He is a graduate of the United College of Canada, Augustburg College, Bethel Seminary, and the Northwestern Theological Seminary in the United States.

While still in Russia, Dr. Vojta witnessed the revolution in which many Christians were persecuted by the communists. He was himself arrested and imprisoned because of his preaching of the Word of God.

As dean of the Russian Department, Dr. Vojta is making an important contribution to missions in the postwar world by training young men and women for missionary work among the Slavic peoples. Three of the department's former students are already missionaries in Czechoslovakia, and three others plan to go across within the next few months. Dr. Vojta is constantly helping western Europe financially, materially, and spiritually as funds permit.
