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Second Filbert Worm Control Spray Due Now

Filbert growers who have trouble in filbert worm control may find it profitable to apply a second spray or dust now, according to Palmer Torvond, county agent. After a prolonged period of inactive filbert moths are again becoming active and laying eggs. B. G. Thomson, entomologist at Oregon State college said this week

Spray should be applied before August 23. The same materials as used in the first spray are recommended. A spray consisting of three pounds of lead arsenate plus 100 gallons of water or DDT used at the rate of two pounds of 50 per cent wettable DDT to 100 gallons of water is recommended.

Those who are using dust may use either a 40 per cent lead arsenate dust or a 5 per cent DDT dust. The rate of 40 to 50 pounds per acre. The only feeding done by the larvae before entering the nut is on the underside of the leaves, therefore it is imperative that the under sides be

thoroughly covered with the spray or dust material. Where DDT is used it is suggested that the ground beneath the trees be well sprayed or dusted. Growers who have both worm and a blight problem may use a combination spray Torvond said. The recommended spray consists of a combination of 50 percent mixture 5-2-100 plus three pounds of lead arsenate to which a compatible efficient spreader sticker has been added.

4-H Contests to Be Held at Fair

All 4-H dollar dinners, demonstrations, bread baking contest and special clothing contests will be held for the first time at the county fair, August 25, 26 and 29. Ten winners will represent Washington county at the state fair, County Agent Palmer Torvond said Monday.

The events will be held in the new 4-H building which is being built by the fair board. The Junior Dollar Dinner consists of preparing and serving a meal for four people in three and one-half hours. The senior contest is allowed four hours, acting as hostess and catering with her guests and the judge.

The home economics demonstration teams consist of two members of a standard club. They will demonstrate phases of health, foods, clothing, homemaking, and dairy foods. The junior and senior bread baking contests will bake one loaf of bread before a judge using the recipe and making the bread. Senior contestants will also prepare and bake a pan of rolls.

The special clothing contest is open to those enrolled in clothing IV and V. This contest will be to make two kinds of seams and two kinds of hems in two pieces of woolen material such as wool crepe and suiting. The public is invited to attend these contests.

The local grade school will have eight teachers this year instead of seven as of last year. The upper south room is being divided to make two rooms. This will make six rooms in the school house and four in the gymnasium.

was the first time in 20 years these 100 old neighbors got together.

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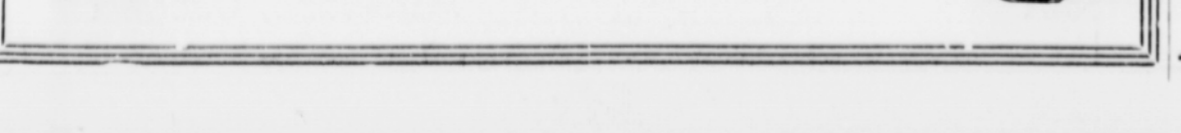
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
