cluding the dairy barn, 4-H building and a newly-constructed assembly hall to accommodate 4-H club demonstrations throughout the three days of the fair.

Horticultural and agricultural exhibits for judging have been moved from the Grange building to the room upstairs over the 4-H building. Here also will be found the farm veterans exhibits and an extensive exhibit of the work performed by the adult education clubs of the county, including sewing, child projects and upholstery classes.

Educational exhibits include the Health Association's mobile X-ray unit, army recruiting exhibit including a P-40 jet engine; the state forestry exhibit, which includes a complete lookout station; the Journal helicopter, which will be at the fair for one day, and "Hobby Hall."

**Equipment Being Shown**  
In the farm machinery section will be numerous machines now available, pumps and electrical appliances. Because of the shortage of heavy machinery, not a great deal of this will be found. Throughout the buildings in the realm of better living including furniture and household appliances.

There also will be provided plenty of entertainment, both free and for an admission charge. A midway will be installed along the road from the east gate of the fair grounds to the auditorium, along which will be concessions on both sides, with rides at the east end.

Under the auspices of the State Horseshoe association, contestants from all parts of Oregon will vie daily at the fair grounds for the championship horseshoe pitcher of the state. Washington county tossers have been invited to a county tournament beginning Wednesday afternoon with the winner qualified to enter the state tournament.

**Amateur Show Slated**  
Amateur entertainers of the county have also been included in the festivities and can present their acts for \$100 in cash prizes in Starlight Theatre on Thursday, Friday and Saturday nights. The winners of the first two shows will vie for top honors Saturday night. Forest Grove Lions club is sponsoring this event.

An extensive exhibition of personal hobbies will be found again this year in Hobby Hall. Early interest and entries in this section seem to forecast an unusual display. Hillsboro Lions club is the sponsor. All displays this year will be fenced to prevent handling or loss of valuable articles.

Thursday evening and every evening thereafter will be entertainment in "Starlight Theatre" and dancing in the auditorium. Old Timers will whirl to the music of Grace Whitehead and her orchestra Thursday night, with dances on the following two nights to the music of Hazel Fisher and her all girl band. Both orchestras were at the fair last year.

Friday and Saturday will find the riding club having their days. Friday will be the Junior Horse show in the old ball park, and the seniors will ride in thrilling contests Saturday afternoon.
