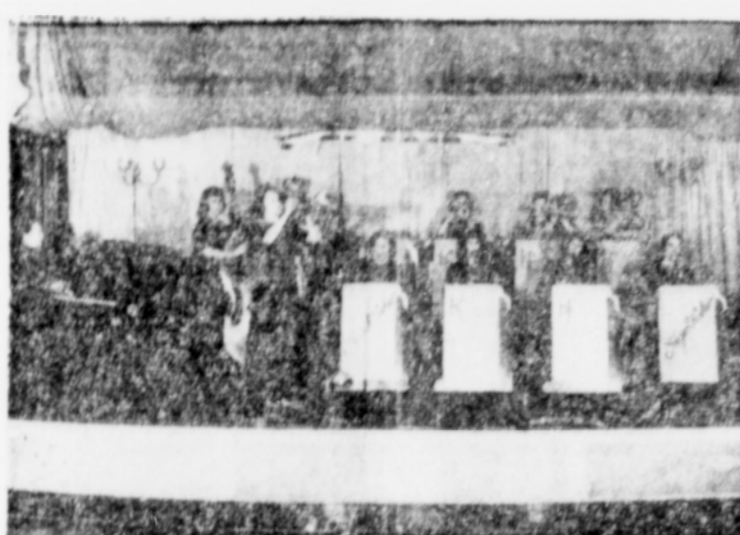


Golden Wedding Celebrated Sunday; Club Sews for T. B. Mobile Unit
