

Congregational Conference Opens Monday at Grove

Five-day Northwest Regional conference of congregational churches opens Monday at Pacific university Forest Grove, with an imposing list of speakers. General theme will be "Vital Evangelism for Today."

The conference, which is expected to bring more than 75 persons, opens with dinner and registration Monday night and will conclude with luncheon following a special service and Holy Communion on Friday.

Rev. Wofford C. Timmons, assistant secretary of the general council of Congregational churches, is set to speak on "The Need of the Hour" at 8 p. m. Monday. Dr. Timmons is a leader in pushing a national re-education in New York City.

Dr. Allan Whitby, professor of Old Testament, Eden Seminary, St. Louis, Mo., is another featured speaker. Others include Dr. Truman L. Douglas, executive vice-president of the board of mission of Congregational churches in New York City; Dr. Ralph Lee Wood, ward assistant professor of pastoral care at Yale university; director of revival, Rev. Arthur Seward, minister of Holbrook Congregational church at Livingston, Mont.; and Miss Christine Skelton, director of religious education, Washington State conference.

Pacific university program, led by President W. C. Giesbrecht, is set for Thursday evening, followed by an address "Discovering and Training Christian Leaders" by Dr. Woodward. A panel on the "Basis of Union" will highlight the Wednesday evening program at 8 with Rev. W. C. Giesbrecht, minister of the Eugene Congregational church, as chairman.

Laymen's round table discussions are set for Tuesday, Wednesday and Thursday evenings at 9:30. Northwest Congregational leaders attending the sixth annual conference will be housed in dormitories at Pacific university. They will eat at McCormick hall. Dr. Fred S. Richards of Forest Grove is on the business committee making arrangements for the meeting.
