

Filbert Buying Prospects Poor, Chandlee Says

Present marketing conditions for Washington county's large filbert and walnut crops are very poor, William H. Chandlee of Oregon Nut Shellers reported Wednesday.

Chandlee, who returned this week from a 30-day business trip to all the big trade centers where large quantities of filberts and walnuts are carried, said almost all were stocked up with carry-over orders of nuts and that there was very little prospect of any early buying this year.

The only remedy for the present

flooded filbert market, he said, is to clean up last year's carry-over crop and this year's big crop and to market them at prices low enough to move about 15,000 tons of filberts. Only 6,000 tons of filberts were sold at last year's high prices, he said.

Chandlee added that present marketing conditions for Oregon nutshells appear to be better than last year's because of doubtful imports of the shell filberts from the Mediterranean area. Large quantities of the shelled filberts are expected from the Mediterranean, however, he added.

Chandlee's trip included visits to Vancouver, B. C., Winnipeg, Canada, Minneapolis, Chicago, Philadelphia, Pittsburgh, Washington, D. C., New York, Boston, Detroit, Kansas City, Omaha, Denver, Salt Lake City, Los Angeles, San Francisco and other large cities. He expected relief to return to "beautiful, cool" Oregon.

Salem Co. Gets Water Line Job

A contract for laying the last five miles of Hillsboro's \$860,000 water line was awarded Monday night to Salem Sand & Gravel Co., it was announced by City Manager J. W. Barney after a meeting of the city utilities commission.

The Salem company bid \$92,352 on the project, almost \$35,000 under the next lowest bidder, Rushlight Automatic Sprinkler Co. of Portland bid \$127,352 and Q. L. Ruffner of Portland bid \$128,262.50.

The work consists of installing about five miles of 18-inch steel pipe from Cherry Grove to the intake section just below the mouth of Lee creek near the old Haines power site. The first three miles is to be completed by November 30, 1947, and the last two miles by August 31, 1948, Barney said.

Completion of the entire line this year was felt impractical by the commission, and by finishing three miles of the last link the line would be laid to a point above Lee falls, permitting the city to pump water from the Tualatin river next year if necessary.

Intake and screening construction, to cost about \$20,000, will get under way next summer, Barney added.

Portlander Killed In Auto Accident

William S. Hawkins, 21, Portland, died early Monday on route to a Forest Grove hospital after the car he was driving left the road and turned over just outside the Washington county line seven miles west of the Sunset highway junction, according to James Dierckx, deputy county coroner.

Chief Deputy Sheriff Dick Busch said Hawkins was believed to have fallen asleep while driving toward Portland. The body was turned over to McGinnis and Wilhelm mortuary in Portland by Donelson & Sewell mortuary.
