Silas Bechen Funeral Held

Funeral rites for Silas J. Bechen, who died Sunday, August 24, at Laurel, were held Wednesday afternoon at 2 o'clock at the Portland Crematorium, with Rev. J. F. Gibson conducting the services.

Silas J. Bechen was born May 8, 1892, in Minnesota, the son of the late Mr. and Mrs. J. C. Bechen. In 1901 the family came to Oregon, settling on a farm at West Union, with the exception of a short time spent in Alaska and the Middle West and 18 months with the armed forces in World War I, he had made his home in Washington county.

On May 23, 1936, he married Ruby Brown Inbrie. To them two children were born.

For many years he farmed in partnership with his brother Carl on the home farm. In 1942 he moved to his own farm at Laurel, where he was residing at the time of his death.

He is survived by his widow and two children, Thomas E. and Dorothy Ellen, and the following brothers and sisters: Mrs. Howard F. Brannan of Tacoma, Wash.; Mrs. Ed Cooklin and Mrs. Eleanor Bechen of Bend; John C. of Bellefleur, Cal.; Harry B. of Klamath Falls; Mrs. Esther Bechen, Mrs. Arthur W. Conwell and Carl G. of Hillsboro. A sister, Mrs. Tina Rollins, preceded him in death.

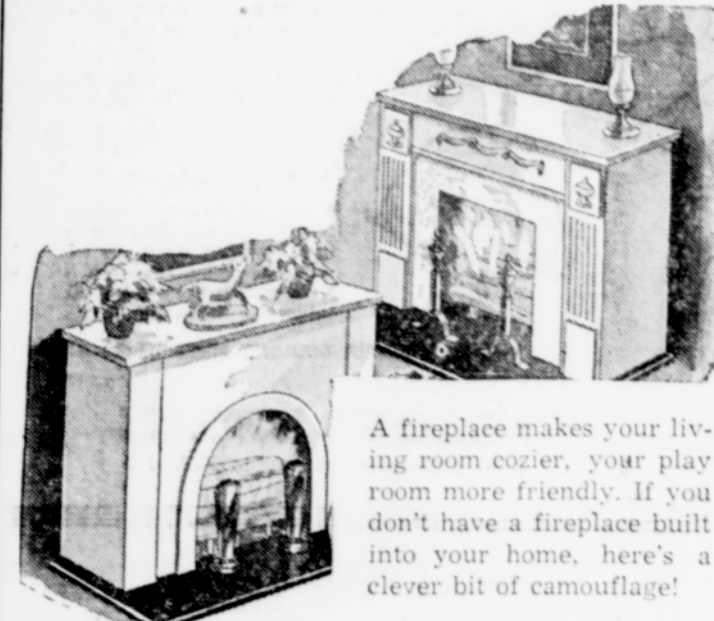
Interment was in the Forest Grove cemetery.
