

War Trophies Safety Group Set Up in County

Formation of a Washington county War Trophies Safety committee to assist war veterans in preserving their war trophies and in preventing dangerous trophies from being sold or given away was announced here this week by L. D. Hickman of the Alcohol Tax Unit, Portland.

William C. Hammelman of Hillsboro was elected chairman of the group at an organization meeting on Friday. Rev. Clifford N. Trout was drafted as secretary. Other committee members are W. R. (Hap) O'Connell, Leonard Sherman and Arnold Seeborg, all of Hillsboro. Other committee members will be added from surrounding communities, Hammelman said.

The committee, operating under the slogan, "Know Your War Trophies," was organized here as part of a program started by the treasury, war and navy departments and the National Rifle Association, in Washington, D. C. The purpose of the local group, Hammelman said, is the promotion of public safety in the handling of explosive-type war trophies such as land mines, grenades, shells, projectiles, cartridges,

semi-automatic pistols, machine guns and machine pistol is brought under control from the battlefield by veterans.

Any person with a rifle, pistol or other weapon may bring it to Hammelman at Lyle's store in Hillsboro for examination, he said. Persons possessing a grenade and other explosive devices will be examined by an army ordnance expert. Hammelman said. Inspection of such trophies will be arranged by members of the committee.

Persons desiring information and assistance in conversion of war trophies to sporting use were asked to contact Hammelman at the Oregon Electric depot in Hillsboro. Hammelman can be contacted at the Hillsboro airport.

Major Fires in County Total 9

Nine major fires, each resulting in a loss of over \$5,000, were reported in Washington county during 1946, according to the annual report of the state fire marshal.

Losses in three of the blazes were over \$10,000 each, the report stated.

Three of the fires involved farm barns, four involved dwellings, one covered dwelling and barn, and another involved a lumber concern. All but one of the blazes occurred after May 30.

Fires in Hillsboro last year resulted in a loss of \$18,384, the report showed. The percentage of loss to actual value of the property involved was 5.37 actual value of the property given as \$342,103. Amount of insurance paid for fire loss in Hillsboro last year totaled \$14,050.

Two deaths were recorded in the county as a result of fires last year, the report stated, one occurring in Hillsboro July 28 and the other in Gaston August 18.

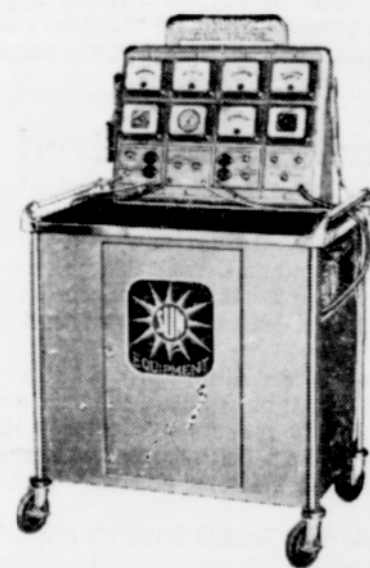

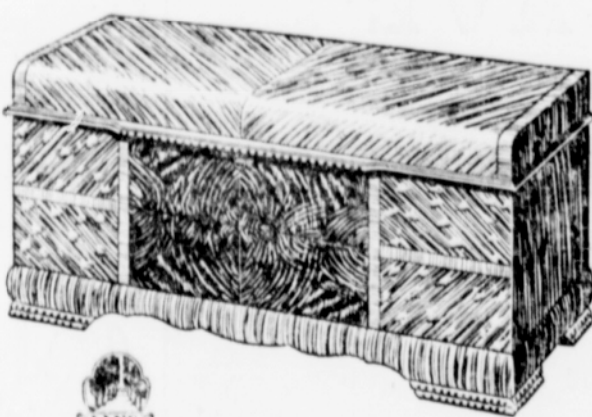
