

County to Get \$11,825.39 in Lieu Of Lands Taxes

A total of \$11,825.39 will be paid to Washington County in lieu of taxes on Oregon and California lands owned by the federal government, according to a P. Collins, district forester in charge of the Salem office, bureau of land management.

Washington county received payment of \$5,405.39 under this act. The current payment on Washington county's share in 50 percent of the gross receipts from O and C forest lands and is made by the federal government from the sale of timber derived from the sale of timber. By law, this money must be returned to the Oregon counties in which the lands are located.

County revenue from this source has risen steadily since 1938, when the O and C lands were placed under sustained yield forest management. Sustained yield forest management requires that timber cutting be limited to the capacity of the land to grow new timber. Under this plan, the lands provide a permanent source of income for the county.

Revenues received by the county in lieu of taxes may be used for roads, schools, or for any other purpose for which the county funds may be spent.

Should Label Products

Governor Earl Snell recently suggested that the word "Oregon" should be featured in the trade names and advertising of the products. He sent letters to several chambers of commerce requesting their cooperation in this project. In reaction to the suggestion, the word "Oregon" has been included in the trade names of many products, such as "Oregon" Medford Peas, and so forth.

The response has been gratifying, the governor reports. He continued, that their famous Oregon products, along with many others, are shipped all over the United States and to foreign countries, and we are missing out on opportunities for far greater publicity for the products grown and processed within our state.

Legislative Vacancies
Under the provisions of an amendment to the election laws, vacancies in the legislature caused by death or resignation will not be filled by appointment unless a special session of the legislature is called prior to the expiration of the term. Two seats in the senate and one in the house of representatives now exist. The vacancies in the senate were caused by the death of Senator Lee Patterson of Multnomah county and Senator Merle Chesman of Clatsop county. The resignation of Representative Earl Hill of Lane county, following the ruling of the Oregon supreme court that he could not retain his legislative post and also act as a member of the state fish commission, caused the vacancy in the house. Rumor has it that Hill will become a candidate for his seat in the house in which event he necessarily would resign from the fish commission.

Tax Education Needed
When State Tax Commissioner Earl Fisher told the County Assessor's association that Oregon's per capita tax is only \$58 annually compared with Washington's \$73 and California's \$82, he spoke of a campaign of tax education. State officials including legislators are planning publicity on Oregon's advantages that will be specifically for home consumption. Politically Oregon has led, with Australian voting systems, and a great number of other progressive movements which have been adopted by other states—none by all.

October 27 Navy Day

Hunger Awaited In Europe, Asia

A hungry winter for millions in Europe and Asia despite all the food which can be supplied by the United States and other food exporting countries has been predicted by leading U. S. department of agriculture authorities and the local agricultural conservation official.

P. Anderson, chairman of the United States voluntary food conservation committee, said that the responsibility of helping feed a hungry world, but adds that it is now evident that it will not be possible to ship as much grain this year as we did last year.

Present evident reductions in the corn crop and the continued threat of further frost damage only add to the problem. The secretary says there is no substitute for grain in preventing starvation in Europe and Asia. Grain ships well, stores well, and is easily and sustainably life longer per dollar spent than anything else. But grain is relatively scarce. Under the current administration, the secretary of agriculture, adds this realistic statement:

"The world is going to be fed even as well as it was last year, and that was not well enough by a large margin. Exporting countries like the United States, Canada, and Argentina, which together send abroad about 50 million tons of grain. But the most we can see for wheat, including both North and South America, is about 28 million tons—about half enough."

Conservation of Soil Urged Here

The old adage about not missing the water until the well runs dry is too true when it comes to conservation of soil, according to Albert E. Krahmer, chairman of the Washington County Agricultural Conservation committee.

Return of War Dead Slowed by Shortages

Parents of war dead being returned to the country for burial should not be concerned over delays occurring between the time bodies are shipped to the home of dependents, Dolph Stuart, county service officer, said here.

The army has estimated it will require three to four weeks to deliver all the bodies of any shipment to the next-of-kin because a reduction of manpower makes available just one-fourth of the required number of escorts.

Bodies of war dead will continue to be returned to this country for as are received in New York or San Francisco caskets will be sent to one of 13 army depots for shipment to next-of-kin. The Pacific Northern depot is located at Auburn, Wash.

The government now allows up to \$75 for funeral expenses of persons who died in service overseas during World War II when burials are in private cemeteries in this country. Fifty dollars was allowed for funeral expenses up to October 1. Cremation is authorized at the request of dependents, with a bonus and serial number of the veteran inscribed.

Wheat, Rye Goals Announced Here
The wheat goal for the state of Oregon has been set at 1,000,000 acres, E. Harvey Miller, chairman of the state PMAA committee, announced. This is a little less than the acreage of wheat planted in 1947.

The chairman announced at the same time that the Oregon acreage goal for rye has been set at 42,000 acres, an increase of 1,000 acres over the acreage of rye that was harvested this year.

The national goals for both crops have been increased over last year because of the world food situation. For the country as a whole, the wheat acreage goal will be about the same as last season's plantings. The rye goal calls for a little more than half a million acres, more than was harvested this year.
