

Chamber Asked To Back Rural Fire Districts

G. E. Montgomery of Farmers Mutual Fire Insurance Co. of Washington county, Tuesday called on the local chamber of commerce to "make a greater effort to establish more rural fire protection districts" in this area.

Speaking at the weekly chamber luncheon meeting, Montgomery said that inadequate fire protection facilities was the main reason for heavy fire losses in rural areas and that the chamber of commerce should "work a little harder for better fire protection" for the county's farmers.

He pointed out that fire losses in the nation's rural areas rose to \$100 million last year. C. Henry Nelson, of Walker & Nelson, said many fires could be prevented by frequent inspection of wiring, places where dust collects, and fire extinguishers. In order to be prepared in the event of fire, he suggested that business men take yearly inventories and supplement them with running inventories of sales and purchases. Complete office records and up-to-date property appraisals are also important, he added.

Discussing insurance costs, Jack Rushlow, local insurance man, said the increase in costs was much smaller in insurance than in other commodities.

William Wieber, of Tualatin Valley Insurance agency, attributed increased costs in automobile insurance to increased costs of cars, shortage of parts, increased costs of repairs, age of cars now on the road, and increased costs of medical care.

Talks were also given by John E. Meek of Griffith & Meek and by Henry Kuratli of Kuratli & Wismer. The speakers were introduced by Mayor E. A. Griffith. President Mervin W. Brink, announced that the local chamber would cooperate with surrounding chambers of commerce in observance of Armistice day by closing business firms. He also said no luncheon meetings will be held for the next two weeks. The next business meeting will be held at 7:30 p. m. Tuesday, November 18, he said.

Greeters at the luncheon were Ben Faber, Tom Spence and Frank Books, all of Ben Faber Electric.

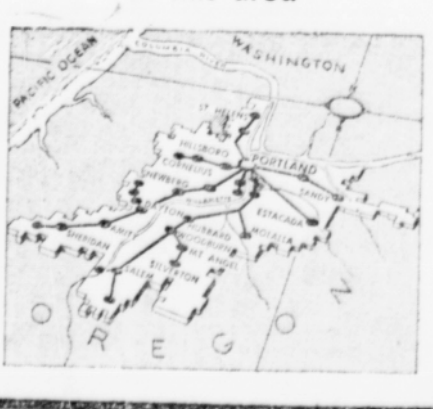
