

Returned Dead to Receive Military Honors If Next of Kin Desire

The Oregon national guard and local veterans organizations are standing by to assist with military honors for Oregon's returning World War II dead, according to the Department of Veterans Affairs.

Inquiries by the veterans' department have been formed by these organizations in local communities to be sure military rites for the burial of those now returning to their native soil.

In addition to these, the U. S. Marine corps and U. S. army recruiting stations and the Oregon military district organized reserve are prepared to send service to next of kin in the Portland area.

Families of the deceased have been notified in every case, however, that funeral arrangements will be as they desire, and they may as they choose. Contact for further information should be made with a Legion or VFW post in local communities it was advised.

Funeral squads ranging from four to eight men and a hearse have been formed in many communities by either the Legion or the VFW.

Youth Jailed After Hazardous Chase

A 16-year-old Tigard youth was being held in county jail this week on a reckless driving charge after he led sheriff's deputies on a hazardous chase through several miles of county roads and city streets Tuesday morning.

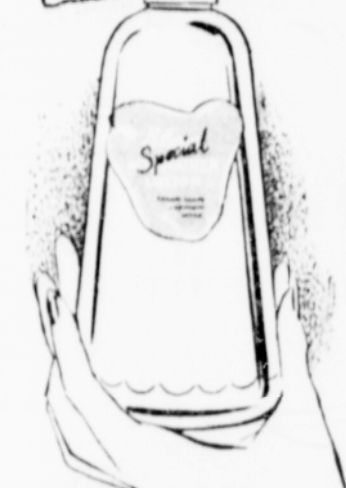
The youth was arrested by Deputy Sheriff Harry King and Neville Bagley after he ran away from Beaverton city police four times in his 1936 Ford and attempted to elude officers a fifth time, Ireland said.

The sheriff's deputies said they chased the youth through Beaverton, clocked him speeding 55 miles an hour, still pursued him through Tigard going 70 miles an hour in a 70-mile-an-hour zone, and saw him cross highway 90W twice at about 75 miles an hour. The boy raced through six stop streets, attempted to wreck the two deputies' car, and disregarded two pistol shots fired in the air as warnings to stop, Ireland added.

The hearing was set for 10 a. m. Monday before County Judge H. D. Kerkman.

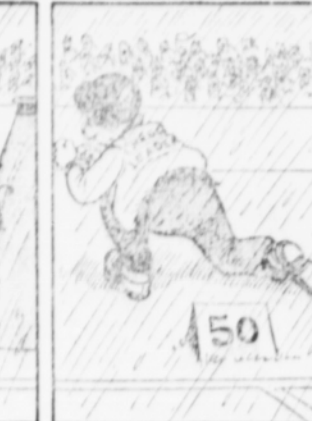

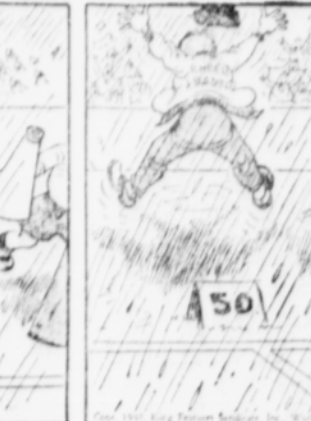

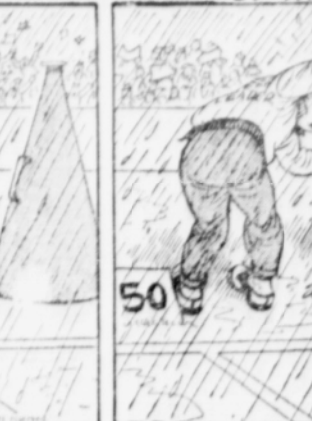

Homesland Project Opening in Arizona

Twenty-eight family size farms on the Yuma, Arizona, project have been opened to homestead entry, it was announced here by Dolph Stuart, county service officer.

The opening comprises 1439 acres of land with farm units ranging in size from 28 to 82 acres.

Veterans interested in the project were asked by Stuart to write for full information and necessary forms to the bureau of reclamation, Yuma, Arizona.

Stuart said he was informed last week by the bureau of reclamation at Klamath Falls that, having unforced difficulties, there will be a land opening on the Klamath project late this year. Additional details, he said, should be obtained by writing the bureau of reclamation, Klamath Falls, Ore.

Officials Debunk Spring Drinking Water Theories

The generally accepted theory that spring water is always safe for drinking purposes and that water purifies itself because of its motion was reported as entirely false here by Dr. H. M. Stoltz, district health officer, and T. W. Christensen, sanitarian.

"Water which is constantly open and not protected can easily be contaminated by animals, livestock and other means," the officers pointed out. "It is very essential, they added, to have a structure over the spring, which will protect it against contamination. Special attention should, as in the case of wells, be given to the exclusion of surface water."

The following suggestions were given to help make the water safe:

1. A diverting ditch should be dug several feet from the spring area and completely around it on the uphill side.
2. The spring area should be adequately covered by means of a concrete box.
3. The back side or bottom of the box, depending on the nature of the flow, will be open or perforated to allow entrance of the water. In any case, the collecting box must be of tight construction, preferably of concrete.
4. The box should be carefully covered as described in the Argus last week for dug wells.
5. The box should have an overflow pipe, screened to prevent the entrance of insects and rodents.
6. A bottom drain pipe and valve may be added, if it is necessary to remove sediment tending to collect in the box.

"Springs producing water from shallow sources are considered as subject to the same dangers as are shallow wells," the officials stated. "It is always a shallow source that gives the most trouble as far as quality for drinking is concerned."

More detailed plans, diagrams and suggestions for springs were obtained from the sanitarian in the county court house, it was added.
