

AAUW Speaker Tells Experiences Of World Travel

The greatest defense in the world today is perhaps not to give offense, Robert Dunn, professor of sociology at Oregon State college, told members of the A. A. U. W. at their luncheon meeting Saturday in the American Legion hall, about 30 women attended.

"It pays to live carefully," Mr. Dunn said, "for by doing so, we take care not to give offense."

Mr. Dunn, 42, married with a wife, a professor of psychology at Oregon State college, gave accounts of his experiences in traveling to different parts of the world under the auspices of American Friends Service committee, recently announced as the winner of the Nobel peace prize.

The work of American Friends is all done with one conviction: that if we seek the truth we will find it, and if we seek on the basis of what we know, we will find a world that is creditable. Mr. Dunn said, "We must prepare for the peace in the world."

In outlining the work of American Friends, Mr. Dunn said college students, for example, will take a problem area such as in the deep South, or in a closed mining village, and set up a work camp with the idea of the Friends, so that they can find a problem and come with it on the basis of their own experience. There needs to be practical demonstration of the people, he said, and the more we discover, the more we can work out programs of adjustment.

The students will stay in the work camp about eight weeks during the summer, paying their own expenses, and working side by side with the people to work out a recreation project, or a garden project, or whatever the problem, according to Mr. Dunn. The Friends are working today in many countries in addition to the United States and England, and are endeavoring to bring relief to war-stricken areas, although their work is being done in Russia, and not much in either Germany or Spain, Mr. Dunn said.

"It is a case of promise to pay the bill—working for nothing," he said.

The next meeting of the A. A. U. W. will be Thursday, December 11, in the First Congregational church in Forest Grove at 7 p. m. Instead of having all meetings on Saturday, as the association has done here in the past, the chapter decided to have very other meeting a dinner meeting on the second Thursday of the month.
