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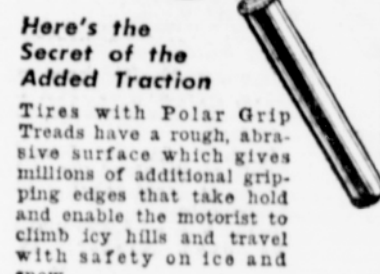
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In its final games, however, to take undisputed possession of third place.
