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Bond Issue Vote Marks 3rd Time Election Called

The special January 19 Hillsboro school election to vote on a \$58,000 bond issue for completion of school district No. 73 building program marks the third time the school board has asked for building funds since 1935.

The first election was held in October, 1945, when \$165,000 was voted for the city's grade schools. An additional \$250,000 was authorized last June. A total of \$30,000 remains from a building fund started in 1943. With approval of the \$58,000 bond issue, the district's building fund will be swelled to \$58,000.

Eligible to vote are all persons whose names appear on the last property assessment rolls of the district, and stockholders in any company or corporation whose name appears on the assessment roll. The election will be held from 2 to 7 p. m. in the B. W. Barnes grade school on North Third avenue.

A total of \$33,838.06 has been earmarked from the fund already, according to J. W. Poynter, superintendent of local elementary schools. Biggest project started was construction of the new David Hill grade school, cost of which \$48,488 is architects' fees. The B. W. Barnes-Boscov school cafeteria and heating plant cost the district \$49,510, of which \$2802 was architects' fees.

Biggest project remaining in the city's school-building program is the proposed B. W. Barnes school physical education plant. Also planned is renovation of the old David Hill

school into a physical education plant and cafeteria, and reworking of the Barnes school.

Bids on the Barnes school gymnasium, which were opened by the school board last Tuesday evening, far exceeded original estimates. Board members stated. Low bidder was Johnson-Sterner, Portland contractors, with a bid of \$137,470. The firm promised to complete the building within six months after construction is started.

Other bids received on the building were: H. J. Satergren, \$138,000; Buckfast Construction, \$142,688; C. M. Cowham Co., \$143,173; and Home Construction Co. of Beaverton, \$149,022.

Members of the district school board are Mrs. Lena Peters, chairman; Albert Hartman, Byron Goodman, Keith Wilcox and Jake Weil.

WITH THE EIGHT ARMY, KYOTU, JAPAN, December 18. He has been announced by Headquarters First Corps, Kyoto, Japan, that Pfc. Elroy C. Schindler, son of Mr. and Mrs. H. Schindler of Hillsboro, has recently been transferred to the Fourth Replacement Depot, Zama, Japan, to await further orders to

proceed to the U. S. for discharge from the service.

Pfc. Schindler was formerly assigned to the 1st Corps Military Police platoon, where he served as a military policeman in Kyoto. He has been commended for his gallantry and supervising the Japanese police systems in Kyoto, Japan, largest inland city in Japan, with a force of 200 men, the military police with 24-hour jeep and foot patrol. His job is one of particular glory and glamour but the authority of the military policeman in Japan is respected by both the Japanese people and the military personnel.
